# IN PRAISE OF ATHEISM

It has been said, with some degree of justification, that there are very few real atheists in the world today. This is true partly because few men . can function without some kind of god. But it is true also because there aren't many men with the courage to be an atheist, in the usual sense of the word. Subtract God from the worldview of the Christian and what has he got? A reeling cosmos without direction or order. A race of animals like himself ultimately freed to do as they very well please. A life which has no overarching purpose and for which there is no transcendent guidance. And on and on. Despite everything else, there is something tragically grand about a Bertrand Russell or Albert Camus. Behind their actions there is a steel courage and restless dedication that puts flubby splitlevel Christianity to shame. And their courage is all the more remarkable because they don't rely on a God to back up their words and deeds with an eschatology.

Most of us would make lousy atheists. In addition to the fact that we wouldn't have the courage to take all the manifold consequences of serious atheism, we just couldn't really drop all of our <sup>C</sup>hristian baggage. We've been born and bred in the midst of it, and it's as much a part of us as our hair or ego.

And unfortunately, many of us make pretty bad Christians as well. We all ritually admit this at one time or another, but how very rarely it gets under our skins and really itches us. With all of our Evangelical emphasis on the radical nature of sin, perhaps we are developing duck-like surfaces off of which our self-accusations roll elegantly. We pormel ourselves theologically, but <u>somehow</u> our ego always seems to bear up under the beating. Dissetiof entities as the result of

Dissatisfaction as the result of frustrated idealism may well be one of the chief characteristics of young people. Recently the president of Wittenberg University pleaded for more positive thinking about the Church. He expressed an impatience with all the groaning about what's wrong with the Church. Certainly he has a point. Worry-wartism is a source of delight to many in the Church today. Yet despite the glorious commission of the Church, the triumph of her Lord, the miracle of her heritage, no man can really rejoice until he can say he is a new man in Christ. Perfection is not the issue; oneness with God and with our brothers and sisters in God is. If Christ really makes a difference, should not that difference be apparent at least in my own life? Should I not be vitally concerned if a brother seminarian is ill or discouraged or sinful? Should I not reverence the seeds of faith, however small and weak, whether expressed in bad stained glass lavingly donated, pious platitudes which sustain sanity in an insane world, pathetic theological searching in forbidden pastures? Should not the thought that the Lord died for me move me profoundly to a sense of my own ingratitude and helplessness?

If the Christian Gospel does not touch me at any really vital point in my life, can I placidly face the awesome task of proclaiming the Word and being a priest to my trothers?

These are terribly basic questions which are asked because they'are very close to this writer's heart. I confess that I do not have the answers. But one thing seems quite clear to me:real courage and real honesty may lead any one of us into some form of atheisr, but at least we will be facing the issues head-on and not white-washing the old Adam. And who knows: perhaps we must throw it all away in order to be found, to know forgiveness, to taste love.

I for one shall pray for the courage of an atheist!

# AN EXPERIENCE IN CHURCH - LABOR UNION DIALOGUE

On May 6 and 7 fourteen seminarians gathered in Atlantic City for the Religion and Labor Council of America Regional Seminary Conference, held in conjunction with the convention of the United Auto Workers. While the undersigned was the lone representative of Mt.Airy, there were delegates from Gettysburg, Eastern Baptist, Gordon Div.School (Interdenominational), Episcopal Theological School (Cambridge, Mass.), and General (Episcopal) Seminary. This was a disappointing response, considering that all major seminaries in the New England-Middle Atlantic area were invited to participate.

The RLCA exists in order "to attempt to educate the clergy concerning the goals and objectives of the labor movement, and attempt to educate union leadership to the necessity of being guided by ethical principles in day-byday operation." The Executive Board is composed of Protestants, Roman Catholios, cern to the Christian conscience. and Jews, both clergy and laity. The Council provides two regular publications; <u>Religion and Labor</u>, a monthly review, and <u>Walking Together</u>, a weekly newsletter.

The Conference was planned in such a way as to provide opportunity for the seminarians to attend Convention sessions, and also to allow for group discussions with union officials and clergymen concerned with the labor movement. On Sunday night we were guests at the Convention banquet, where UAW Social Justice Awards were given to Eleanor Roosevelt, Upton Sinclair, and Mary Heaton Vorse. On Monday morning we heard Dr. Ralph Bunche address the Convention; in the afternoon we attended a spirited session at which a resolution was adopted to divert union funds for the organization of union workers in foreign countries.

As a group we met with Victor Reuther, assistant to the president of the UAW (his brother Walter), and a member of the Department of the Church and Economic Life of the National Council of Churches. Mr.Reuther warned that unless the Church relates itself to social and political concerns it will yield the field to those who can make

decisions in these areas without ethical standards. He also stressed the importance of avoiding "cut and dried" solutions to complex economic problems, In a luncheon session Leonard Woodcock, UAW Vice-President, briefed the group on the problem of automation and its relation to unemployment, a matter of great concern to the auto workers. On the clerical side, we met with the Rev. Emerson W. Smith, a director on the General Board of Christian Social Concerns of the Methodist Church. Mr. Smith stressed the importance of pastoral concern extending to an understanding of the layman in his work relationship and the need for the Church to reach the "decision-making elite" in the community, including labor leaders. He pointed out that many of the problems with which labor is wrestling, such as unemployment and care for the aged, should be of great con-

Many of us went to the Conference doubting that any positive results could come out of the work of the RLCA. Striking evidence of the kind of results that can come from the interest of religious leaders in the labor movement is to be found in the Public Review Board of the UAW. This Board is the final court of appeal for union members having grievances. Chairman of the Board is Rabbi Morris Adler of Detroit; members include Msgr.George G. Higgins, Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam (Methodist), Dr. Henry Steele Commager, the noted historian, and distinguished jurists. This is a unique suspension on the part of the UAW Executive Board of its juridical sovereignty, in order to bring high ethical standards to bear in the consideration of grievances. As a result of this Conference, I feel that the RLCA can perform a service to the parish pastor by keeping him informed through its publications of what is happening within organized labor, and to the entire Church as a witness of our concern for social and economic justice and for ethical standards within unionism.
