SENIOR CLASS PRESENTS STATUE AS GIFT ADMINISTRATION THIS

Today at 11 a.m., the Senior class will present their gift to the administration in the rotunda of the Library.

With new buildings in the offing and a desire to give something wirthwhile, the Senior class lit upon a work of art as its parting token to the Seminary. The acquisition of an appropriate object was fraught with difficulties, however. The decorative value of the work was a criterion along with its artistic integrity and its religious connotation. And all this was in turn limited by the budget. The Seniors hope that they have not been unsuccessful in any area.

After considerable hunting and deliberation a statue was purchased. The artist is Charles Kapfelian, a graduate student in the Fine Arts department of the University of Pennsylvania. He has studied at the Universities of Connecticut and Hartford, and received the bachelor's and master's degrees from Penn in 1962 and 1963. On the basis of this work and others in the same series of twenty-five statues Mr. Kaprelian has been awarded a Fulbright scholarship to Italy.

Although it gives the impression of being cast in bronze, it is actually constructed of fiberglass. It is the standing figure of a man with his head thrown back, his whole frame cast to one side. The artist laughs now to say that he originally called it: "Martyr--promise of life." It was to him as he made it, and may be for many others, a protest against God and the "religious" in man. But the anguished "No!" is not too far from the life it denies.

The Senior class leaves this statue in the hopes that it may be recognized

and enjoyed as a fine work of art, but they also hope that it may be an arresting and challenging expression of man's situation. The Senior class wants viewers of the statue to appreciate it, but do not mind if the viewer is disturbed by the emotion it portrays.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR:

Recently, Councilman George X. Schwartz conducted an open hearing regarding an amendment to the Fair Practices Bill in the state of Pennsylvania and The amendthe city of Philadelphia. ment intends to provide penalties for violations of the Bill, and institutes a more adequate legal system to enforce the Bill. Currently, violations incurred anywhere in the state are handled by one judicial board appointed for this purpose. Hence, although the State has a law protecting against discrimination in employment, housing, and public accommodations, it has no effective way of rendering justice. It is for this reason that an amendment is being considered to this bill in the city.

At the first hearing on this amendment, there was no word of support by my Christian denomination in the city of Philadelphia. It must be added that two clergymen did speak on behalf of the amendment, but only on behalf of other organizations (i.e., CORE). However, in lieu of the fact that other hearings are intended to be held, the Board of Social Ministry drafted a reply to Councilman Schwartz with copies to other members of City Council, and pastors of the District, etc.

The reply of the Board consisted of citing numbers 4, 5, and 6 of the official Lutheran words pertaining to these matters, and in the final paragraph after their listing, concluded:

"This is part of a statement on Human Relations, adopted in 1961 by the Board of Social Missions and the Executive Board of the United Lutheran Church. It is our opinion that the sections quoted indicate affirmative support of the principles of the legislation proposed in Bill #2256."

"(Quoted from the letter of May 3, 1963 from the Board of Social Ministry to Mr. Schwartz.)

Now, why have I brought this to the attention of the seminary students and froulty?

First of all, it seems to me that

here is an issue which needs the sunport not only of the Christian Church. but also of the Lutheran Church. Not only is this bill the only source of hope for some 300--500,000 citizens of the city in terms of work, housing, and public accommodation, but its support is also a sign that the Church is concerned for the persons involved. Even though we missed the opportunity to speak in the first hearing, and even though we made an immediate reply when we were aware, it seems to me that we failed by missing that first opportunity. We need to be ever alert to our neighbor's need.

The second thing that broubled me in this matter has to do with the reply made by the Board. The question that came to mind when I read this was why did we revert to a 1961 statement? Cranted this official statement can serve as a guide, and might well be included as a copy for Councilman Schwartz, yet why did the Church not make a more vital statement of support? It seems to me that in this situation the Church could well have put its faith in its own words, especially for the sake of those whose future hope depends upon this measure.




SUMMER ADDRESSES AVAILABLE
