OPEN DETTER TO THE JUNIOR CLASS
FROM STUDENT BODY PRESIDENT SHANNON
During the presidential campaign, there is much talk over the subjects of big government versus small government. I am not certain under which category I'would place the Student Body government, As in comparison to the bureauoracy in Vashington, ours is nerely like spitting in the ocean as far as size is concerned; but then as far as the size of the Student Body, I think that we can say that we have a fairly extensive organization. We have twen-ty-two committees among which the operations of the Student Body will be divided. Our organization operates with money which is derived from two sources: 1) Dues paid by each student; and 2) monies which the committees themselves bring ik as a result of their functions. Last year a little more than 33,400. passed through our Student Body treasury.

Tonight at $7 \mathrm{p} \cdot \mathrm{m}$. the Junior Class will be introduced to the administrative machinery of the Student Body. But I do not winnt the members of the incoming class to sit back and merely be observers of the administrative machinery. Rather, I would like to encourage that the members of the Junior Class consider participation in one or more of the connittees of the Student Body governnent. Your Student Handbook outlines the functions of the various comittees as well as giving a brief sumary of the comittees' activities during the past academic year. You aight want to consult this as information in helping you select the comittee in which you would like to work. I encourage your activity in the Student Body government; I think that you will find this work to the benefit of the Seminary community as a whole. Greg Shannon, president.

Dr. Heiges is the president of the Lutheran Theological Seminaries both at Philadelphia and Gettysburg. He will be dividing his time $b$ tween the two destitutions, but on schedulod, preditable schedule, according to Mr . Kaufan. In his absense, Mr. Kaufnan will be carrying the brunt of the administrative duties, while Dr. Lazareth will be handling the acadomic sduiniatration as academic dean of the faculty. His job will be to work with. course development and requirenents, and related matters.

## SIGEL CITES ORIGINAL TEXT OF LORD'S prayer to lutheran clergaran.,

Mr. Charles P. Sigel, Now Testament and Greek professor, told Lutheran Clerzymen this summer that biblical scholars are gonerally agreed on the text of the Lord's Prayer Jesus spoke nearly two thousand years ago. It differs radically from that which appears in Matthow and Luke. He said the prayer is 34 words long compared to the 66 -word Lord's Prayer in Matthew and the 58 -word version in Luke.

The text of the 'original' version follows:

## "Father

Let your name be hallowed,
Let your kingdom come,
our daily bread grant us today, And forgive us bat debits even as we forgive our debtors, And do not lead us into temptation, ${ }^{\text {' }}$
In an effort to determine the prayer Jeaus spoke, lr. Sigel said scholars tend to use the prayer as it appears in Natthow and Luke.
"In terms of lonsth, we look to Luke," he said. "In terms of words and patterns we look to Natthew." The prayer in Vatthew is the basis of the fordia Prayer used, by Iutherans.

Mr. Sigel spoke to 20 Lutheran clergymen at Muhlonberg College who wore attending a week-long Pastor's Institute sponsored by the Board of Theological Education of the Iutheran Church in America.

"IMPOSSIBLE COMBINATION OF TAIENTS" WANTED BY CONGREGATIONS IN A MINISTER

The average congregation wants for its minister "an inpossible combination of talents," a Lutheran elergyman told a seminary Eraduating class this spring.

Speaking at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, Rev, Dr, Robert E. Lee, Atlanta, Ga., said:
"In no other vocation are so many talents needed and expected as in the Christian ministry in the mid-20th century."

Dr. Lee, pastor of Redeemer Lutheran Church, Atlanta, since 1955 , said that "the average, and even the above average, congregation wants in its "ainistry an impossible combination of talents."

The pastor is expected to be "a brilliant or at least an effective preacher," but in addition:
"he must be a top-flight student of theology, scripture and public affairs;
"he must be an educator \& teacher;
"he must be a cenius at administretion and organization;
"he must be a specialist in public relations;
"he nust be an expert on finances and money mattors;
"he must understand the problens of youth as woll as of old age;
"he rust be a competent and trained counselor, aware of the psychological and psychiatric, as well as the spirit-. ual needs of people;
"he nust have the courage to speak out, even when ho knows that it will bring disfavor with sone;
"he must know more than a little about legal procedures, the restaurant business, and property repairs and maintenance;
"he must be something of an architect;
"he must understand good church music;
"he must be concerned with civic and social problems;
"he must get along with people, even those whom he knows are criticising hit;
"he must have a pleasing personality, With the patience of Job;
"he must be the essence of tact and refinement;
"he must look prosperous without being prosperous;
"his wife and children are expected ta be paragons of virtue;
"he must have the physical stamina of a workhorse;
"and being all of these thinge, he nust nover, nover forget that he is ordained to do only two things: to preach the Vord of God and administer the Sacraments of Holy Baptisu and Holy Comanion.
"And no man is! IT's an impossible combination of talents. In no other vocation are so many talents needed and expected as in tho Christian Ministry in the mid $-20 \mathrm{th}^{\circ}$. contury:" PRT

BOARD OF AMERICAIT MISSIONS MAPS NEW FIELDS FOR OCCUPANCY IN NEAR FUTURE

The Board of American Missions of the Iutheran Church in America approved five new fields for occupancy and extended 12 calls to prospective dovelopers at the conclusion of its quarterly meeting in Detroit last weok.

Of the 12 calls extended, two pertoin to inner city churches in Chicogo and $\theta l e v e l a n d$.

The nev fields into which the ICA will move under the auspices of the BAM are in Palo Alto, Calif.; Bolivar, Tenn.; Prior Lake, a suburb of Minneapolis; Jonesboro, a suburb of Atlanta; and Oak Creek, a suburb of Milwaukee.

The Board also approved four oity churches for urban status which entitles thes to assistance fran the Board. They are: Incarnation, Milwaukee; Holy Trinity, Pittsburgh; Messiah, Detroit; and St, Simeon's, Philadelphia.

The Board reported 744 LCh congreeations under salary aid progran of which 60 are currently without a pas* tor and fíve pre preaching points. * Ninety-five aission fiolds are under development, and 15 scheduled for organization before the end of the year Six congregations were organized since last June 15. Two congregations achieve self-support since the same date.

LCA has 6,200 congregations with a combined membership of $3,227,157$. PRT

another lca seminary begins merger talks
The board of directors of Harma Divinity School has voted to "pursue a policy that may lead to eventual nerger with the Evangelical Lutheran Theoloeical Seninary in Colunbus." Harna is a theological schoul of the Lutheran Church in Anerica. The Columbus serinary is supported by tho Anorican Lutheran Church.

Harna is the third ICA seninary this year to seriously consider nerging with another theologionl school. Other LCA seninaries which are engaged in nerger negotiations or have joint adninistrations are those in Philadelphia, Gettysbure, and Saskation, Sask., Canada.

The Manna board's action resulted fron the naster plan for the denorinations seninaries adopted earlier this month by the churchS convention in Pittsburgh.
