

DR. HEIGES HOLDS UNPRECEDENTED NEWS CONFERENCE WITH STUDENT BODY WEDNESDAY

In an unprecedented move in the recent history of the Seminary, Dr. Heiges held a news conference with the Student Body on Wednesday afternoon in the Chapel. Following is a condensation of the comments and personal evaluations which Dr. Heiges made on matters which relate to the present and future state of the Seminary:

I should like, this afternoon, to say a few things on three subjects and then if you want to fire questions, you can do so. I would like to say a few things about the joint administration plan, secondly about the inauguration program, and thirdly about the Capital Funds Appeal and the related item of the relocation of the Seminary.

The Memorandum of Understanding includes five articles. The second article specifies that the President shall divide himself equally between the two institutions and give major interest to each, subject to limitations of time and energy and that he shall be assisted in the discharge of responsibilities at each school by an administrative dean. The administrative dean, in effect, is sort of the acting president when the president is not around....

The third article has to do with the joint executive committee. The joint executive committee is made up of 12 persons, six members from each board. For the Philadelphia these men were named in May. For the Gettysburg board they will not be known until after the November 10 meeting of that board. The reason is that the Gettysburg board decided to name the members of the Executive Committee of the Gettysburg Seminary Board as its members on the joint Executive Committee. This is why the first meeting of the new committee has been delayed until the later part of November.

This committee will have authority in designated areas. This is designated authority. Legally, only the boards have authority in these areas, but this authority is delegated to the joint Executive Committee. This authority is final, except that either board can register a formal dissent of its decisions. This is a matter of veto although the word "veto" is not used. But unless a board registers a formal dissent the actions of the joint executive committee stand.

The seven areas for which the joint executive committee has authority are as follows: first, the determination of the academic year. On the surface this isn't very important but if the two schools are going to cooperate, this is one of the unimportant things which must be settled to avoid conflict of crucial dates and so forth. Furthermore, if we come to the point where faculty members will be exchanged in the two schools, it is necessary, obviously, to have the quarters beginning and ending at about the same time if not exactly at the same time.

Secondly, it has responsibility to make nominations to the respective board for any faculty position. This means that if the Philadelphia faculty wishes to recommend to its board a nomination for the position of Professor of Old Testament, the faculty can suggest this person's name to the joint executive committee but the joint executive committee has the authority to make the nomination

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back to the Philadelphia board. This provision was introduced for several reasons: one, to avoid a competitive situation in which each seminary is trying to outdo the other in terms of securing new faculty men. But the other reason, and probably the more important, was the desire to integrate the two faculties. In other words, if this faculty is strong in one area and if we develop the system of exchanging professors for a quarter, then it is foolish to develop an equally strong emphasis at the other institution. So the attempt has been made to nominate persons for the faculty to build up a joint faculty of balanced strength.

Third, an area of responsibility is academic advancement. If it is desired to advance a faculty member from associate to full professorship, this advancement will be made by the joint executive committee without referral to boards. This was done again to avoid undue competition.

Four, nominations to any major staff positions. By major staff positions, we would include the post as librarian, registrar, dean of students, business manager, and so forth.

Five, setting the salary ranges. Note salary ranges, it doesn't say that the joint executive committee shall set salaries, but it shall set ranges in which the board could set the salary. The reasons for this are obvious.

Next, develop cooperation between the libraries of the seminaries. This has been much talked about for a number of years, but nothing ever accomplished. This can develop in rather informal ways but eventually we hope to have a joint card catalog with the libraries so that anyone going into this library and examining the card catalog and finding just exactly the book he wants and discovers it in the Gettysburg Library, the book can be secured the next day. The resources of both libraries would be available to each student and faculty.

The area of joint pre-seminary study program. This is already under way in the area of Greek. As you know, Philadelphia

is requiring Greek for entrance in the Fall of 1965.

And finally, the responsibility for the operation of a joint summer program of graduate study. Nothing has been done on this. Each seminary has been talking for years about developing a graduate summer session. But it is felt that we ought to proceed together and how this is to be done no one knows, except it is the seventh area of responsibility.

Article four simply spells out how the president is to be paid, and where he shall live.

The fifth article specifies that the entire membership of both boards shall meet annually in joint session. In all probability this joint meeting will be held in May and likely at a halfway neutral point of Lancaster. This is my guess. The annual meetings of both boards are scheduled in the fall.

Now, I have given you the legal requirements of the Memorandum; I should like very much to see closer relationships develop on the student and faculty levels. I would like very much, in the course of the year, if the presidents of the two Student Bodies could arrange for 25 of the Philadelphia students to spend a day at Gettysburg and 25 of Gettysburg students spend the day here. It would be a swap of personnel to expose the students to what happened on the other campus.

On the faculty level, we are beginning by having all members of the Philadelphia faculty and their wives visit Gettysburg on October 3, for luncheon and the faculty members will meet in serious session and listen to a paper by Prof. William Lazareth reporting the meeting of a commission of the World Council of Churches which took place in Denmark in August. The next step will be for the Gettysburg faculty and wives to come down here for a similar occasion.

INAUGURATION HAS TWO PARTS

The inauguration really has two parts to it: the inauguration proper which is scheduled for October 21 in the afternoon at St. Michael's Church. Dr. Fry will be the speaker; and then at 6:30 in the evening there will be a banquet over at the School for the Deaf. They anticipate that about 400 people will be at this

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banquet. This is being announced as the celebration of the beginning of the Second Century. This is the sophisticated way of saying that this is the launch of a capital funds drive. Invitations have gone out to all sorts of people in the supporting synods. The program will again feature Dr. Fry, but there will be other speakers and special events. Unfortunately, we will be unable to invite the entire Student Body either to the inauguration or to the dinner. However, as I understand it, I think the brass of the Student Body will be invited to both occasions and some arrangement is being made in the evening for those students who wish to listen to the program to do so, but they can't be fed. This is sort of a preview of what I understand is to come.

CAPITAL FUNDS APPEAL

I would like to say a few things about the Capital Fund Appeal. The board of the Seminary voted to relocate the Seminary in the vicinity of the University of Pennsylvania and to ask each of the seven supporting synods to support a capital fund campaign in 64, 65, & 66.

The Eastern Pennsylvania Synod approved this resolution; The New York Synod approved the resolution; the New England Synod deferred the campaign until 1967, 68, & 69; and the New Jersey Synod deferred action until the next convention. Supposedly, the Slovak Synod approved it too; I do not know what the Caribbean Synod did; but the seventh synod--Western Pennsylvania--West Virginia--was reassigned to Gettysburg, so that the supporting Synods are six in number.

As far as I know, the capital Funds Appeal will be launched on October 21 and will involve only three Synods: Eastern Pennsylvania, New York, and the Slovak-Zion Synod. It is not set yet the exact objective for each of these Synods but the overall objective for the appeal has been stated in terms of four to five million dollars. The appeal in the other Synods will be carried out at the time specified.

RELOCATION OF SEMINARY

There has been overwhelming judgment in the board and the faculty that the

seminary carry out properly its responsibility to the church as well as to the academic world in the vicinity of the University with which it would conduct constructive relationships on several levels. This is the aspect of this development which governs the selection of the site. The word is, of course, that there is no site. However, there are things to be pointed out. There is a committee of the board called the site committee. This is chaired by Dr. Claude Wagner, a Philadelphia attorney, and has on it a rather impressive real estate and urban development personnel. They have been working since the board met on February 5. Its first investigation of West Philadelphia where the University is located indicated nothing available in sufficient proximity to justify consideration. It then turned to the other side of the Schuylkill and considered two sites: one at the Art Museum and down along the river, not too far from Market Street.

Yesterday I went down to meet with Mr. Graves, who is a member of the site committee, because he thought he had found a site which might be suitable & I spent the afternoon wandering around West Philadelphia looking at this. But the word is that no decision has been made on site and it was hoped that a decision could be made on the site before the Capital Fund Appeal. It is my opinion that no decision will be made on site for a matter of months, because it is an extremely critical decision to make and a mistake here could have all kinds of implications and repercussions. The consensus I believe on the faculty is, not necessarily the board, that a site in West Philadelphia must be secured to carry out the intentions of the board. This would rule out any site on the other side of the river. But we don't know yet whether this can actually be achieved.

This is about where we stand in the Capital Funds Appeal and on the matter of relocation.

(Following this presentation, Dr. H Heiges asked for questions from the Student Body. These and his answers will be published in next week's paper.)

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN TO BE PRESENTED TO BOARD OF TRUSTEES ON OCTOBER 21

The Capital Campaign, of the Seminary will be presented to the Board of Trustees of the Seminary at their meeting on October 21 by John F. Rich Company, fund raisers. This company has be n conducting a survey of the entire field of possible support for the Seminary and will make its report to the Board at that time. This report will determine the scope and size of the Campaign. All of the details of the Campaign will be handled by the John F. Rich Company.

A summer seesion in Elementary Greek will be offered next summer as a joint program of the Lutheran Theological Seminaries at Philadelphia and Gettysburg. Satisfactory work in either section will be accepted as meeting the Greek entrance requirements of both seminaries.

The Gettysburg section will be held at Upsala College in Esat Orange, New Jersey. Instructor of the A section (Gettysburg) will be Leigh Jordahl, Ph. D., a member of the faculty of the Seminary there. Instructor of the B section will be Arthur F. Carlson, Ph.D., a member of the faculty at Upsala College.

Lutheran students will enroll for this Greek course through the Seminary which they expect to enter in the fall of 1965. Students not expecting to enter either seminary will enroll for the Gettysburg section through the Seminary at Gettysburg and for the Upsala section through the Seminary at Philadelphia. Tuition and lodging fees will be payable to the seminary through which a student is enrolled for the course.

Fees and the financial responsibility of either seminary will be set at the meeting of the executive committee of the Board of Trustees on October 1.

MIDDLER FIELD WORK BEGINS

Between October 1 and May 1, Middler students will be involved in field work in the Philadelphia and surrounding area. They will be available to the parish were assigned every Sunday for duties as agreed upon the pastor and the Middler.

During seminary holidays Middlers will not be expected to attend their assignments. These dates are: Nov. 29, Dec. 20, 27, Jan. 3, Feb. 29, Apr. 18, 25. A calendar is enclosed in this issue which shows all of these dates. During these holidays, Mrs. Prigge points out that students are not expected to be at their assignments.

Students will be reinbursed at the rate of 7¢/mile for milage to and from churches. Expenses which are paid for out of the student's pocket will be reimbursed. These reinbursements will be handled by the Seminary. It is hoped that there will also be anoug money left over to grant each student an honorarium at the end of each month.

George Freeman has resigned as secretary of the Student Body. Mr. Freeman was elected to this position at the Student Body meeting last April, and has served in this position since that time. He was one of the students who was chosen for the Pilot project, and for this reason, he found it necessary to sever all ties with Student Body government. Greg Shannon has appointed a nominating committee which will put two names into nomination at the first Student Body meeting, as required by the By-Laws. Of course, nominations may be made from the floor. Those appointed to the Nominating Committee are Paul Hirth, chairman, Paul Payerchin, and Tom Chittick. It may be noted that these men are themselves ineligible for the office of Secretary.

Mr. Freeman also resigned from other positions which he had held with the Student Body. He had been one of the Student Body representatives to the newly created Student Housing Commission. Hal Johnson, a senior, was appointed to fill Mr. Freeman's position. Bruce Johnson, who was a junior last year and who had been appointed to the Housing Commission last Spring, has also resigned from the Housing Commission. Mr. Johnson decided to take an intern in Allentown, and therefore will be unable to serve on the Housing Commission. Ray Thiel, a junior, will serve in his stead.

Mr. Freeman had also been chairman of the Hall Chairman Committee. Paul Frable, a Middler, has been appointed in his place. Margaret Ann Johnson will be unable to serve as chairman of the Card and Gift Committee, since her husband will be interning in Allentown. Bruce Schrader will serve in her position. Lee Longrie, who lost his batchelor buttons over the summer, has resigned as Telephone chairman, since he will not be living in the dormitories. Bob Boyer has assumed this position.
