DAY AFTER RETIRING OUT ON VIETNIANA

Dr. Earl S. Erb, executive secretary of the LCA's Board of World Missions will retire on December 31. The following day, Jan. 1, 1968, he will begin serving the LCA's Eastern Pennsylvania Synod as parttime employee of the synod's Board of Christian Education. He will be responsible for ministry to students on college campuses located on synod territory. He will also counsel students training for the ministry or considering entering the ministry of the LCA.

Dr. Erb will return to the same territory he left in 1953 when he went to New York to assume the direction of the Foreign Missions Board of the then ULCA. He had been secretary of the Board of Christ ian Education of the Ministerium of Pennsylvania from 1941-44. He subsequently bettories in humane ways that are spelled out. came secretary of benevolence and synod. secretary of the same Ministerium of Pa.

The Mt. Airy Players extend a cordial invitation to all students, faculty, staff, and friends. We feel that the message of Bonhoeffer's struggle is as relevant today as it was thirty years ago.

America's military organization is practicing overt and continuous violation of the Geneva Convention on the treatment of war prisoners, it was charged by a poet who is an LCA layman. In an article strongly documented by on-the-scene reports published in the American press, Robert Bly accused the U.S. forces of terturing and murdering prisoners and also of handing such PW's over to the South Tietnamese military for even more wholesale atrocities against them. He pointed out that the 1949 Geneva Convention, which the U.S. signed and ratified, specifies that not only soldiers of regular national armies, but also "insurgents and revolutionaries" in armed conflicts like that of Vietnam, when captured, must be treated by signa-

Under another provision of the convention, when a signatory transfers war prisoners to another power, the capturing power remains responsible for insuring that the protection guaranteed under the convention is still provided, he stated. Citing the "habit of American commanders... to turn over almost all live prisoners to the South Vietnamese army," Mr. Bly noted that "from the beginning of war, the South Vietnam government...has simply ignored the Geneva Convention altogether. There are well documented cases of serious and crippling tortures (as well as) horrifying and sadistic mutilations carried out by South Vietnamese authorities, "in addition to the instances of cold-blooded murder of PCW's, he said.

Mr. Bly recalled that "several high officials of the S. Vietnamese government have stated flatly that they consider captured Vietcong political prisoners, not prisoners of war, " despite the contrary provisions of the Geneva Constitution. The author added that television coverage and "hundreds of reports by newspaper correspondents" make clear that American troops themselves are also torturing or shooting without trial persons entitled to POW status

The article appeared in the fall issue of "SALT" the discussion quarterly which the LCA Board of Parish Education edits for adult and student groups throughout the church. Mr. Bly, a midwestern poet who has held read-ins in protest against the war in Vietnam, commented that he was disturbed by "the moral cowardice of the Lutheran Church, of which I am a member,

HAVE YOU

---been involved in experimental ministries to youth in your community?
--- developed and carried out new types of ecumenical encounter among youth?

--- discovered ways to involve youth in the total life of the church?

--- heard of any ministers, churches, or laymon who have done any of these things?

If so, you can help the Department of Youth Ministry of the NCCCUSA. They are trying to develop a collection of reports on new forms of youth ministry into what we are calling a "Data Bank". They need a general description of the project and an evaluation and some conclusions about what the ministry has achieved. The collection of data will be classified and evaluated by the Department and made available as a resource to others interested in similar new forms.

DATA BANK ON NEW FORMS OF YOUTH MINISTRY

To refer to our age as a revolutionary time is no longer a picus theological cliche. Significant change is occurring, both at home and around the world, change which forces us to ask what is happening with youth and how this effects the church's ministry. An important result of this questioning is that more and more, churches are moving outside their formal and traditional structures to experiment in new and creative ways of ministry with youth. Although many churches and/or their ministers cannot be helpful to others of like mind, simply because the existence of the project is unknown outside of the neighborhood in which it is carried out. From any such experiment there will be valuable conclusions and suggestions for new directions to be followed, even when the project is a "failure" in the eyes of its creator.

That we are attempting to do is bridge the "communications gap" between those inv lved in experimental ministries. To do this, we are developing a collection of reports and reflections on experiments in youth ministry which can provide a base for communication between these persons. The idea of this "data Bank" is basically simple. First, we end urate all those who have in the past or are at present working in some experimental ministry to contribute a short essay doscribing their project. Such an essay would give a general idea of what is involved in the experiment through (a) a paragraph on the environment or context in which the ministry takes place, e.g., suburb, rural, innercity, and perhaps a designation of this area as e.g. a high school district, munber of city blocks. entire tawn, etc.; (b) one or more paragraphs describing the essential activities of the ministry together with the reason why this particular form was selected: and (c) an evaluation of the project riving the insights of the person(s) who initiated and carried out the ministry, including an indication of the response from groups in the community, the hidden problems which arose, and the extent to which the ministry seemed meaningful. Since it is part of the nature of an experiment that it may fail, reports of both "successes" and "failures" will be helpful. The essay may be of any length. If we feel that additional information would make the report more useful, we will ask you for it.

As this collection of "data" grows, it will be classified and evaluated and in some cases developed into full "case study" form. Persons interested in a particular approach to youth ministry would be able to draw learnings and resources from the experiences and reflection recorded in the Data Bank, and be enabled to make a ntact with others who have attempted similar efforts. National demoninational youth staffs and publications will be enabled to keep in touch with a wider variety of new forms of youth ministry.

Hopefully, this collection of information will enable those involved in youth ministries to pool their efforts in a limited way, and by providing directions and help, stimulate further experimentation in ministry to youth.

If you have contributions for, or questions about, the "data bank", please see Mr. White. He has additional information available.
