# SEMINARY AND UNIVERSITY SIGN COOPERATIVE PACT

This seminary has entered into a Cooperative Agreement with the University of Pennsylvania it was announced by Seminary officials last week. While maintaining the legal autonomy of both institutions, the arrangement calls for the mutual exchange of courses, credits, faculty and facilities between the seminary and the university's Graduate School of Arts and Sciences. #### MARKET SQUARE COFFEE HOUSE TO OPEN JAN. 27

The formal agreement was signed at the U. of P. on January 9, 1958. Representing the university were Pres. Gaylord P. Harnwell, Provost David R. Goddard and Dean Michael H. Jameson. The seminary representatives included Pres. Donald R. Heiges, Board Chairman William C. Berkemeyer and Dean William H. Lazareth.

The new relation provides the academic structures for "promoting contact and the exchange of ideas" among faculty and students of the 2 institutions. Penn President Harnwell reiterated the university's cordial position: "We welcome the seminary most warmly and look forward to extending to it all possible courtesy of our facilities and to the pursuance of cooperative programs and other undertakings."

Dean William H. Lazareth is the first of the Lutheran seminary professors accredited by the university to teach graduate-level oourses in Penn's Department of Religious Thought. Speaking on behalf of his colleagues, he said: "This agreement guarantees that our new seminary will be university-related as well as urban-oriented. We believe that's an unbeatable combination for preparing better equipped pastors to serve in the Lutheran Church's mission to megalopolis in northeastern United States.

President Heiges presented President
Harnwell with a copy of T.G. Tappert's
History of the Lutheran Theological Seminary, which traces loose ties to the
university back to the early days of
American history. From 1779 to 1898, the

## R THE WEARY

An Exegisis of <u>Jack and Jill</u> from Ztschft. fur alg. Biblfschng.

Verse I: "Jack and Jill went up the hill, to fetch a pail of water."

The word "and" presents some difficulties which are not apparent to the casual reader. There is considerable doubt in the minds of most scholars as to whether Jack was actually accompanied by Jill, in the sense that the phrase is intended to record an historical event.

In the setting out upon this expedition, which was apparently undertaken for a specific purpose, or at least, with some definite object in mind, it seems likely that Jack was stimulated to undertake this mission by a basic need for water. Since most functions in the home involving water, such as cooking, washing clothes, scrubbing floors, etc. are normally undertaken by the distaff side, it is widely held that the force of "and" in this context probably means that Jack set out with a strong picture image of Jill in his mind, and several existentialist scholars also insist that her marting words were undoubtedly ringing in his ears

Grosskopf, in his monumental essay entitled <u>Jackmit jilldamrotarung</u>, takes a contrary view. He dates this passage considerably earlier than is generally believed (somewhere between 404 B.C. and the 19th Amendment). On this basis he maintains that the hewing of wood and the drawing of water were exclusively carried on by women at this period, and that the words, "Jack and" are a gloss by some later copyist, and did not appear in the original manuscript.

"Went up the hill" is obviously allegorical. The ancients, although probably ignorant of Otis' First Law of Evaluation ("What goes up must come down."), were well aware that the transfer of water by artificial means normally involves transportation from an inferior to a superior position (e.g. The Old Oaken Bucket, Down by the Old Mill Stream, etc.). Professor Card de l'Eau, the distinguished hydrographer and mystic, suggests that this anabasis symbolizes man's struggle to rise nearer to ultimate unity with the cosmic. The water, he continues, has precisely the same symbolism as the crossing of the Red Sea, the Jordan, Lindberg's trip (Cont. on pg. 4)

SEMINARY & UNIVERSITY AGREEMENT (Cont.)

Lutherah Church was regularly represented on the university's Board of Directors.

One such post was filled by F.A. Muhlenberg, son of the American Lutheran patriarch. Muhlenberg was joined by John C. Kunze, founder of Philadelphia's "Seminarium" in 1773, and holder of Penn's first chair in German Philology. Later in 1868, Charles Porterfielf Krauth of the seminary was also named Professor of Intellectual and Moral Philosophy at the university, to which he subsequently added the position of Vice-Provost.

The agreement anticipates the relocation of the seminary to W. Philadelphia's "University City" at a redeveloped site on Walnut Street between 41 and 43 Sts. Financing the operation is a Centennial Fund Appeal in which \$3.2 million has already been received toward an \$8 million goal, most of which is being contributed by the Lutheran congregations of the seminary's supporting synods throughout the Middle Atlantic States and New England.

aeross the Atlantic, and the landing on omaha Beach in World War II, with which everyone is familiar.

"Fetch" in the original was probably "carry". This transposition of meanings ( ) indicates editorial alteration of the text during the Irrational Period. As H.O. Cuspocus, Prof. of Tautology at the Univ. of Bologna states: "Ia Donna a Mobile, qual piuma la Viants." In other words "Iffa da water she's atta da bottom of da hill, she wanta da water atta da top." This, we submit, is a conclusive argument.

Great care must be exercised in interpreting the word "pail". Some authorities on Celtic history maintain that there is an allusion here to the 12th C Pale. This is borne out by the disastrous ending of the pericope ("Jack fell down and broke his crown..." et seq.). "Beyonf the Pale..chaos" writes Sean O'Gobragh in the only part of his commentary which thus far has been translated from the Gaelic.

So much for verse l...you take it from here!

The new shop will be at 27 E. School House Lane where the hippie shop was located. The hippie store was such a success it moved into a larger store a block away.

The new shop is called "Gogan Magog" after the giants of English legends Gog and Magog.

Jim Schlosser, 25, driving force behind the project, is a social worker at Eastern State School and Hospital, Trevose. He and 4 other people are working on this project. All are professional people.

"We plan to have our public opening Saturday, Jan. 27," he said. "There will (Cont. in next column) be a private opening for our a helpers the night before.

"The decor will be what is traditional in coffee houses. The walls will be black and dark brown and the room will be lit by candles. In addition to the entertainment we are also going to provide for the area's artists. The walls will be lined with paintings which have been put up for sale by local artists. "

He said the shop would be open Thursday through Sunday. It will be open 8PM to midnight, except on Sunday when the hours will be 3PM till midnight.

Schlosser said, "We hope to have other entertainment besides the improvisations. We would like to get some folk singers, have poetry readings and show oldtime films. The plans for the shop are to be flexible enough so we can accommodate the work and ideas of any group or individual, Sunday we will have special programs. The first 2 hours will be devoted to meditation with recordings of 16th and 17th C music played in the background."

According to Schlosser, the coffee shop will seat about 50 people in 2 rooms. There will not be any waitresses and the customers will have to go to a counter in the back room to buy food. The only food served will be pastries, cheeses, fruits and nuts, and an assortment of penny candies. No liquor will be served and the only drinks will be a variety of coffees and teas.

- 1. A reduction in the number of class hours in the second and third quarter of the junior year by making the now "required" elective optional for those juniors wishing to take an elective.
- 2. A reading period before each exam. This involved a number of difficult scheduling and curriculum problems.
- 3. The concern of the middler's over a possible "over-load" in the number of courses in the 3rd quarter.
- 4. A re-emphasis on faculty open houses.
- 5. Mr. Kaufmann and Mr. Horn stressed the need for students to pay their bookstore bill with greater promptness.
- 6. A report on the results of the CFE survey was given with stress upon possible follow-up procedures.

The Committee will continue to meet monthly in discussion of mutual problems. The Committee welcomes any suggestions or concerns of the student body. The Student Committee is composed of Stanley DeCamp, Chairman, Paul Hrdlicka, Drew Fischer, Bill Horn, and Fred Hennen.
