VIEWED
"Political influence in the suburb and small city" was the theme of the first workshon held on this campus under the auspices of the Urban Church Institute. Some 15 parish pastors from suburban Philadelphia along with students and faculty of this seminary participated.

Session foci included an overviev of the purnose and functionin; of local government, political decision-making, tormship growth problems, housing as a metropolitan oroblem, and the relationship of the state to local government.

The workshop leadership consisted of various resource persons from the field. Among them was Professor liorton Lustig of the Fels Institute of Local Government (U. of Penna.), Ir. John Barber, manager of Easttorm Tormship, The Hon. Patricia Crawford, Penna. State House of Te presentative, Donald D. lioyer, director of the Economic Development Council of Northeastorn Penna., and Iilliam Nelsen, Ph.D. candidate in political science at the U. of Penna.

Two seniors were full participants. Their reactions may reflect the dynamics of the workshon: Don 3illeck said, "I received a good insight into the thinking of the suburban oastors and into the nature of political influence as well." Walt liessick obse rved, "I folt the pastors really grappled with vital political issues." Floyd Nesbitt, who also took part each day, said, "A valuable oppurtunity for clergy and seminary students to be made more aware of the complexity of the problems of people in suburban society, and how the clergy can better deal with both the people involved and the problems."

The Urban Church Institute as an agoncy of the seminery vill conduct workshops on issues and concerns related to urban ministry. It also has been designed to carry out reseerch for the larger church and to offer on-site evaluation services to groups of congregations which wish to cooperate in mission. The program of the Institute is directed by Frofessor Andrev J. Thite under the policies set by a steering committee made up of seminary faculty members, representatives of the Board of American lission of the L.C.A. and by other parties with competence and understanding in urban affairs.

## DIE STRASSENBAHN SPALTE

Lest week it was promised that a treetment of the thoories of J. Drahthausen concerning the develoment of the Fhiladelohia streetcar systom would be presented for your enjoyment and edification. Therefore, we turn our attentions this week to this imbortant man and his work. Although many students would perhaps rather start right off rith a study of the system as it exists today, or eliminato the academic approach altogether and actually get on a trolley and see where it goes to, it nevertheless is the opinion of the author that such an approach to this subject is at the same time naive and dangerous. Nlaive because the system as it exists today $c$ an only be understood after one has concorned himself with $j$ ts past history; dangerous because one could very well end up in the stramps of Eastwick or in the untamed wilds of South Philadelohia by merely jumping onto a car "to see there it goes."

But let us turn our attention to Drahthausen. Before this man's epoch-making work, "Die Comosition des Strassenbahnsystems und der historischen Eisenbahnen des Alten Philadelohias," it tas glibly assumed that the entire streetcer system of the city has alrays existed in the form in which we see it today. But Drahthausen put an end to this compleciency by prooosing that the system developed over a long period of time, from the most orimitive horse-drawn vehicles to the modern type of equipment that con be seen today. But whet is most important for us as theological students is the theory that the building of route 23 stands not at the starting noint of the Fhiladelohia system's development but rather at the end. He demonstrates that the features of this line are much too complex and well-developed to have originated at the time of the exodus of the horsecer, and that it was more likely built near the end of the system's develoment. Moreover, he shors that the cars used on route 23 are much too advanced to have originated at the time of the above-mentioned exodus. Drahthausen influenced an entire seneration of strap-hangers, and his influence is still very much alive today. If one wishes to study the Fhiladelphia trolley lines in a serious manner, he is and will remain a force to be reckoned with.

## CURRENTIY

Currently on disolay in the library is a series of facsimiles of pages from early Snglish translations of the Bible. They cover the seriod from 1525, when Tyndales's Nev Testament translntion wes first published, to 1611, when the translation authorized by James I was completed.

The display consists of two neces of each edition mounted with historical information about the work, and particuler choracteristics of the translation. From each translation, the same se ction of the Bible is shown -- Luke 9-11 -- allaring for commarison of the cizht editions represented.

Also included in the displey are the followin transletions: Coverdale (1535), Vatthem's (1537), Great 3ible (1539), Geneva (1560), Bishop's (1568), and the Rheims-Douni (1582-1609-1610).

Supolementing the disolny is a series of volumes of the many modern translations of the Bible.
