CADRE OF CONCERN

The campus of Gettysburg Seminary was the scone of the first meeting of a group of seminarian representatives from all the LCA seminaries, including Canada. Steve Bomgren, Larry Smoose, and Gordon Simmons represented Mt. Airy at the meeting which was held May 14th and 15th. The group was designated to be called a cadre and came about as a result of disc ntent among Gettysburg students which led to Gettysburg initiating the proposal for the cadre. At the main mooting four areas were discussed: (a). The ministry and theological education, (b). The Lutheran seminarian and the syncd, (c). Long range planning, and (d). The organization of the cadre.

The first two areas dominated the discussion and under (a), stress was placed on the "good stewardship of human resources." The proposal was made that it is of utmost importance to match men and women with positions for which they possess skills and talents. It was suggested that the three year parish requirement be dropped and that since there is no biblical or theological opposition to the ordination of women it should be considered proper. Stress was also put on the need for centers which are ecumenical and which serve as areas for dialogue, reflection, and training. The recommendation was made that the church provide scholarships to enable students from minority groups to participate in theological education if they otherwise could not afford it.

In the second area of concern the group hoped that in the future synod church vocation committees could improve the relationships which now exist between the students and these committees. The cadre saw the basic function of the synod committee as one of providing vital professional, pastoral, and financial assistance. It was concluded that the present BTE exams taken by seniors serve little purpose and that oral tests would be more useful for the synod and/or the BTE to establish a student's capability. The cadre called for a consolidation of church vocation and examining committees. They suggested that the process of call and placement be revamped by the use of a national clearing house which would strive to fit men to a situation rather than to a geographical choice. Profiles of the men an the congregation would be used as tools, possibly in a computerized system.

Nost of the suggestions of the cadre were well received by President Marshall, the synod presidents, and the chairmen of the synodical vocation committees. Evidence for this can be seen in the request for a meeting by the synods supporting Gettysburg and Nt. Airy. The meeting participated in by seminary representatives and the synodical presidents was held in Philadelphia during the month of July. According to Larry Smoose, the Philadelphia representative, special attention was given to the subjects call and placement, voice and vote at synod coventions, and synodical church vocation committees. Further results can be seen in the formation of a committee of synod presidents by president Marshall which met in Chicago on Sept. 24th. Larry Smoose attended this meeting also and reports that call and placement, synodical church vocation committees, and voice at vote at synodical conventions were again among the

THE INFLUENCE OF OTHER EASTERN U.S. SYSTEMS ON PHILADELPHIA'S LINES

For many years it was accepted as a given truth that Philadelphia's streetcar system is a unique creation, completely different from any other transportation system anywhere. Pious scholars were quick to point out that while other cities in the Eastern U.S. were running many types of trolleys over their lines, Philadelphia was operating one kind of cor alone. It was also assumed that there were numerous features of the Philadelphia system, such as center-exit cars, one-point track switches, sub-ay-surface lines, and multi-pocket loops which were not to be found elsewhere. However, in the last ten years much research has been done in this area; with the result that we are coming to realize that many of the components of the Philadelphia system are either borrowed from or have parallels in the systems of other cities. The fact that there are cars in both Boston and Pittsburgh that have many features in common with Philadelphia's cars has long been known; indeed, some radical critics go so far as to say that Philadelphia's cars were once c st from the same mold as these heathen streetcars im Boston and Pittsburgh.1 Further, an international group of scholars has recently succeeded in translating the strange inscriptions which are found on the walls of the Woodland Avenue car house (commonly called the Woodland barn). They tell of a race of warriors who also drove streetcars to earn their living (when they weren't fighting); their leader was a motorman with the unusual name of Shuppiluliuma. Heny of the elements of their streetcar system correspond to features in the Philadelphia system. What all this seems to tell us is that the Philadelphia system is quite syncretistic; its compilers did not hesitate to recognize a good thibg when they saw it and adopt it into their own system. This process of adoption took place over a long period of time, and as time went on certain conservative elements sought to purify the system of foreign influences. It is for this reason that route 23 was re-routed in certain areas in North Philadelphia in 1958. Later custodians of the system, however, realized the importance of preserving it in its original form, and with the aid of old system maps sought to reconstruct the lines as they were before these fanatics tampered with them. Their efforts, although well-meant, have been only partially successful, due to the fact that the early system was built without NEXT WEEK: The analysis of the various lines which make up the system.

1 Recent developments in Pittsburgh have led to a removal of streetcars in many areas, due to the atheistic government which has taken over. Great purges took place in August 1965 and again in January 1967. However, certain sects still use the streetcar, in spite of the fact that they must often go to far-flung areas

The committee concluded that there should be more cooperation between synods in order to place men and that synodical committees should keep better tabs on the development of each student. The proposals of this committee will be made to the council of synod presidents, which meets in November.

Under discussion, also, at these various meetings was the subject of psychological examinations and as a result members of the cadre met with representatives of the BTE and BCECV this past Monday. The statement which they issued stated in very general terms that they hoped to work towards solutions concerning the psychological exams.

"The future of the cadre is open. The direction it takes will largely depend on the meeting to be held on November 28 and 29 in Chicago. We should not be concerned about the radical nature of our ideas for there are already enough men in the church to tell us which ideas they consider too radical and why. Rather our concern should be that we use the cadre as an effective channel to voice our ideas. This would eliminate the need for individual seminaries to use radical means in order to draw attention to their problems. Such radical means can only be injurious to the seminary and the church."

The 1969-1970 budget is lased upon student dues of \$15.00 for the entire. academic year, with \$5.00 being added each term to the students' bills for tuition, room, and board.

Explanation of several budget itens:

1. The staff of the <u>Seminarian</u> has requested that an electric typewriter be purchased for its use. The one that they want costs 3425, and the Treasurer, having received the approval of the Registrar, suggests that only 3250 of that amount be paid by the Student Body this year and that the difference be paid by the <u>Seminary</u>, which would have to be reimbursed from next year's Student Body dues.

2. At the President's suggestion that additional funds for intersectionary conferences will be needed this year because of the Cadre meetings, the proposed amount for this budget item has been considerably over last year's.

3. The Chairman of the Chapel*Convocation Consittee states that no funds will be needed from the Student Body this year.

4. A budget item in many years previous to 1968-9, the Mt. Airy Players have again been tentatively listed, their director indicating that financial support would be appreciated.

5. It is suggested that this amount be set aside as a fund which can be used to suglement budget areas finding themselves in need of additional funds and to cover any unexpected expenditures which may occur.
