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STUDENT BODY MEETING...

The first student meeting of the new academic year was held in the chapel during the convocation hour this week. President Larry Smoose first gave the floor to a number of the committee chairmen who proceeded to inform us as to what was in the works at the present time. Paul Britton, chairman of the social ministry committee, said that there were many opportunities for outreach in the immediate community, primarily through cooperation with the East Mt. Airy Neighbors. Some of the areas he outlined included counseling in the local high schools, assisting in the preparation of students headed for college, and taking part in an organized program for emergency blood donations. Paul hopes to compile a list of willing donors and their blood type (SEE PAGE #3) so that requests of aid from the seminary students may be dealt with efficiently. The social ministry committee also plans to write a proposal dealing with consciencious objection which will be placed before the student body for consideration and if approved, sent to the heirarchy of the church.

Marty Roth, chairman of the student life committee, reported that the main objective toward which this committee will strive is to work for direct participation of students in all faculty committees. The student life committee also hopes to work closely with the social ministry committee in order that the community within may be more atuned with the community without.

The inter-seminary committee, headed by Steve Bomgren, stated that the Phil. area is now in a state of flux and hopes that the situation will be resolved this academic year. In his contact with ISM Steve said that the possibilities and potential were tremendous for further progress in this area of theological education.

Craig Tozzo, who lamented the lack of wiskers, reported as chairman of the Chapel-Convocation Committee. The committee is at present contacting numerous speakers across the country and any suggestions will be welcomed by Craig. Dave Newhardt, who is heading the Mt. Airy Players this year, Asked that anyone interested in drama and communications should speak to him immediately if not sooner. At present they plan to work on two, one-act plays which will be presented some time in December. Craig continued by mentioning the supplementary hymnal from which selections could be drawn and mimeographed for chapel services, and a file of prayers, worship services, etc. Any contributions to either of these would be greatly appreciated. In concluding, Craig outlined the primary chapel schedule for the coming year. Faculty will preach on Mondays and on Fridays seniors will take the pulpit. Middlers will be responsible to lead worship during the other three days and later in the year juniors will begin to participate.

Following the committee reports Larry turned the floor over to Carl Schankweiler, treasurer of the student body. The budget for the coming year was outlined by Carl and passed by the student body.

The nominating committee, headed by Bill Horn, then proceeded to announce the nomination which will be voted on THURSDAY, OCTOBER 9th. Don Billec and Dave Newhardt from the senior class were nominated for Vice-president of the student body. Juniors, Hank Beljean and Barry Lace, and Roger Spencer were proposed for the office of secretary.

The last order of business was discussion of a national moratorium on classes for October 15th. which has been endorsed by the National Student Association and the newly formed cadre. The day would be given to sober discussion of the war (con'ted on p. 3)

DIE STRASSENBAHN SPALTE

After three weeks of introductory material, we are at last ready to delve into a study of the streetcar system itself. When one contemplates the system as a whole, without ever having been made familiar with the various parts, the thing appears to be quite bewildering indeed, and this fact is often reason enough for the beginner to either forget the whole thing, and deny that streetcars have any reality, or to adopt simplistic, hopelessly naive attitudes and approaches towards this when properly understood magnificent system. However, it is our opinion that the only real option is to study the system line by line, car house by car house, in the hopes of arriving at some kind of clearer understanding of the whole; and while doing this study one must make use of the formidable body of literature on this subject; indeed, some of these works have already been mentioned in this column.

The best place to start in studying streetcars is with the five lines which make up the subway-surface system. These lines, by name routes 10, 11, 13, 34, and 36, form the most important larger body in the Philadelphia system. All of them follow the same route underground for the first mile or so, and in this respect are hardly any different from the subways with which they share the same tunnel. However, once they emerge out of the dank, mysterious, and disgusting subway each one goes on to display characteristics all its own. But what most riders fail to realize is that these lines are only the end product of years of combining, rebuilding, and re-laying and wiring of numerous lines, each of which at one time had its own separate existence, and its own Sitz im Leben (or for those of you who object to foreign expressions, its own special use in the life of the commuter). The story of the separate histories of each of these lines is quite interesting, and will be traced in more detail in coming installments. NEXT WEEK: The hypothetical Urlinien W, C, and S.

A good example of such an approach is that of the school of Strassenbahnkunde of which Carl D. Shankweiler is the leading exponent. Naturally his school operates from a completely different set of presuppositions than ours, and therefore such absurd and pointless issues as the sex of trolleys are out of the question here, and will got even be granted a passing glance, or even a clang of the bell.

Certain sects claim that only these five lines have any permanence or lasting value. However, the continual re-laying of track and re-stringing of wire on other lines would seem to contradict this opinion, the recent abandonment of route 47 notwith-standing.

DR. PRÖMLE CONVOCATION...

The Seminary's second Convocation of the academic year will be held Wednesday, October 15, at 11:15 a.m.. The featured speaker is the Reverend Doctor Karoly Proble who is presently on his second United States lecture tour. His itinerary includes various Lutheran Seminaries.

Dr. Proble is presently Professor of New Testament at the Evangelical Lutheran Academy (Seminary) in Budapest, Hungary. He received his theological education in Budapest, Hungary, and in the German Universities of Tubingen, Konigsberg, Halle, and Erlangen. The subject of his doctoral dissertation, written for the theological faculty at Budapest, was on The Relationship of Eschatology, Christology, and Ethic in the New Testament.

The Professor's writings include contributions to the liturgical life of the Church. In 1955 he composed portions of the prayer book which is now in use and he was instrumental in the formation of the New Service Book which was issued for use in the Church in 1963.

Other writings include a commentary of the Gospel of Luke, and a book on Theology and ethics for lay people. He has also published two articles which are translated into English for the <u>Lutheran World</u>, the organ of the Lutheran World Federartion.

Dr. Proble is able to come to Mt. Airy through his participation in the Great Lecture Program of the Division of Theological Studies of the Lutheran Council in the U.S.A..

Returning to the United States, Pastor Parkinson became the Chaplain at the Philadelphia State Hospital in Byberry. In 1965 he was appointed Chaplain of the Committee on Social Ministry of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Synod serving the hospitals, mental and penal institutions.
