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ZWEI GETEILT? NIEMALS!

An important development has taken place that is of vital concern to the seminary community and for that matter to anyone interested in what is right and good. Route 15, one of the longest lines in the city, has been cut in two. This route, as you may recall, made streetcar history last year by being re-built and relocated for a half-mile section where the new Delaware Expressway is being constructed. What is even more amazing, service was not interrupted while this feat was being performed, in fact, a temporary track which allowed the cars to by-pass the construction site was used until the new right-of-way was ready for service. However, route 15 again faces construction, but this time no temporary track is being provided; in fact, service over part of the line has been discontinued. Due to the rebuilding of the Girard Avenue bridge, all car service is being forced to loop (in clear violation of everything that is good) at 26 street and Girard Avenue. The service over the rest of the line is now being provided by BUSES. How long this scandal will be allowed to continue is unknown. It has been stated that the bridge will be rebuilt with tracks, but this was, as you may recall, also the story concerning a certain route 47 back in July 1967 when they took down the wires on 8 Street due to subway construction. There too only part of the line was taken off; there too the shuttle service was performed by buses; there too there were nice words for all about the rebuilding of the line and the restoration of service. But we want to see true action, not words about new track. Since that time route 47 has been RUTHLESSLY ABANDONED in its entirety, and people living in the vicinity of north 5 Street are being forced to live without the streetcar. It has also been reported that the Godfrey Street loop has been desecrated by the offering of a sacrifice of macadam on the tracks of the streetcar; if this is true it will have to be known as the Abomination of Abandonation.

Nevertheless, the case of route 15 is far graver than anything north 5 Street has ever known. For, unknown to many, Girard Avenue bridge is the only link between the eastern and western parts of the Philadelphia streetcar system. It has been over these rails that cars passed to and from the Wyoming Avenue shops; it has been over these tracks that cars were shuttled from car house to car house; it has been over these ribbons of steel that old cars passed to their final destiny in the form of dead storage in that dumping-ground of the system, Luzerne Carhouse. But today all this has changed. No longer is the fundamental right to a unified system being honored, no longer is it possible to travel from Chestnut Hill to Eastwick and back via streetcar, and no longer can cars hope to travel about the city under their own power. Of course it is possible for them to be trucked over the gap, but it is expected that very few cars will sink this low as to wallow on the back of a truck. And what is probably the most unkind cut of all, route 15 now must take a back seat at Luzerne Car House to such lines as 50, 56, and 60, while its sister route 10 pines and wastes away in the now almost empty Callowhill Car House.

How long this disgrace will be allowed to continue is unknown. But we know what has happened in the past to other cities' systems. Unless the Philadelphia system returns to the plan of the past, laid out by the fathers, it is doomed to an inglorious end. It must decide today for or against a complete system, for or against one whole system as opposed to many systems. Once the tendency towards rupture gets underway it will not be stopped. It could only mean the end of the line for the Philadelphia cars.

MATINS

The Very Rev. Edward Harris, Dean of the Philadelphia Divinity School, will preach at the office of Matins on Wednesday, November 19. Dean Harris attended the Boston Latin School, and completed his undergraduate work at Harvard University. The Episcopal Theological School, Cambridge, Mass. awarded him his Bachelor of Divinity degree, and Union Seminary a Masters of Sacred Theology. He has also received a Doctor of Divinity degree from the University of Pennsylvania.

Long connected with education, Dr. Harris has been Dean of the Divinity School since 1961. Prior to that appointment he was student chaplain (in charge of all chaplains) at the University of Pennsylvania. He has also been a tutor at the Episcopal Theological School and has taught sacred studies at St. Mark's School, Southborough, Mass.

Dean Harris has also served his church on the parish level. He has been rector of St. Mark's Church, Southborough, Mass., and was for eleven years rector of St. James' (Summer) Chapel in Burkehaven, N.H.

This is the Dean's first visit to Mt. Airy and he is the first non-Lutheran preacher we have had this year.

CONVOCATION-DEC. 3RD

The Reverend George A. Mueller will speak at the Convocation on Wednesday, December 3rd. This lecture will be on the missionary nature of the Christian Church and faith from a Roman Catholic point of view.

As a Maryknoll Missionary, Father Mueller was for six years (1954-1960), the first resident pastor of the church in Oyubari, Hokkaido, Japan. In 1960, he went to Rome where he assisted Bishop Alonso Escalante * the schema on Missionary Activity of the Second Vatican Council.

Following the Council, Father Mueller pursued graduate theological work in the field of missions. This led to a Licentiate in Theology from the University of Dr. Thomas Aquinas (Angelicum, 1961), and a Doctorate in Missiology from the Gregorian University (1966). Since that time, he has been Professor of Fundamental Theology and Missiology at the Maryknoll Seminary, Maryknoll, New York.

Besides his teaching, Dr. Mueller has been the official Vatican representative for the annual Consultation of the World Interfaith Relations Committee of the World Convention of Churches of Christ. He also assisted in the formulation of documents on "Nature and Purpose..." for Maryknoll Father's Fifth General Chapter (Aug 1 - October 16, 1966), and Maryknoll Sister's Special Chapter of Affairs (Oct 7, 1968-Feb 5, 1969).

Dr. Mueller comes to us through the sponsorship of the Board of World Missions of the LCA. He has acted as a special consultant at the January, 1968 board conference to study general objectives, and was the principle lecturer for the annual Missionary Conference held at Kenosha, Wisconsin in July, 1968. Dr. Mueller's itinerary includes all eight LCA seminaries.

"PLAY IT AGAIN, (SAM)... EDDIE"

An evening with Bonnemère and Company...An evening well spent. After an overwhelming amount of applause to great Bonnemère and troupe, the trio started with "Give Me the Simple Life"-it was like watching a man sleeping and dreaming of his music...closed eyes and all. His repertoire was grouped into six sets, all (five in a set, with two exceptions) varying from Broadway plays ("My Fair Lady Medley," "Meet Me in St. Louis,") to movie themes ("Over the Rainbow," "I Feel Pretty), medleys ("South American Medley", "Autumnal Exposure"--"September Song," "Autumn Leaves") and music of the big band era ("Five O'clock Whistle", "Paper Moon")... His accompanists were both "gourmets"...mixing the beats with what should make a good sound--being careful not to add too much or too little...Tympani-to-brushes-to-sticks... "Sticks" Evans -- now we know how he got his name...the man sat there poised with his drumstick...It was like putting the cherry on top of a well proportioned sundae. And Joe Scott, watching Bonnemère's every move to add to the score.

The audience (a most appreciative one) with nodding heads and tapping feet, keeping in time with the beat, moods and flow of the music, was awe-struck by Bonnemère's renditions of "Misty," "I Wish I Knew How It Would Feel to Be Free," and "Help Me, Jesus." Bonnemère, with his "dancing digits", would sometimes run off on his own little way, but would somehow get back to the main theme...and the clock struck 10 ... and 11...but he stayed with it...

A few of those in the audience were being dated when they recognized a Glenn Miller sound or smiled to "I'd Hate to See the Evening Sun Go Down". His music reached everyone, even the children of the "hard rock" age.

The standing ovations showed it was indeed--an evening well spent!
