# IN ANSWEIR TO ...

I read with great interest the article in your paper entitled "Hin Und..." While I did not exactly approve of the author's presentation of his ideas and his analogy, I could understand what he was trying to bring across to your readers.

What displeased me, however, was the fifth paragraph:

"What we have here is a 3-year course on how to be a slave. We've got the slave mentality: obliging and ingratiating on the surface but hostile and resistant underneath."

I was raised in a home where Christian love was dominant and, as a child, attended Sunday School. Because of this upbringing and training, I was taught that the minister was called upon by God to be his disciple and to preach his gospel to those of his Congregation, certainly NOT to be a "slave". It was also my winderstanding, based on the above-mentioned teachings, that the person who chose the ministry as his life's work chose it solely for the purpose of serving God - NOT being his "slave".

Perhaps the author of the article does not know the difference between "slavery" and "ministry". The "slave" has not chosen his work; he has been bonded into it. However, the minister is given a choice. He is not told he must go into the ministry. He chooses it because he loves God and wants to serve Him, not because he is made to serve

If this is Mr. Lace's attitude towards the ministry he should be pitied. Certainly he is not fooling God - only Barry Lace.

# SITZ IMILE BEN

I welcomed Mr. Lace's letter in last week's Seminarian. It is, however, only fitting that I reply. I was surprised to learn that we all were nighters. I was not aware that so many Negroes were students here. If that is not what Mr. Lace meant I am disappointed that he feels about us all that he must use a "vulgar, offensive term of hostility or contempt." But let us not bicker over terminology. Let us

as Mr. Lace suggests get down to the "nitty-gritty."

He nentions that we cannot have a voice in the decisions controlling how we live. To some extent this is true. However, must this situation continue? The "toy government" of which he speaks which is run by "Uncle Tons" which concerns itself with "trivia" is the responsibility of us all. Just this week the final meeting was held concerning the merger. It is indeed unfortunate that the students who are the ones who would have benefited or suffered the most from a merger or lack of it never had a voting presence on the commission. But more on that later. (See letter to the editor in this issue.)

Why is it that a few issues ago in this very newspaper, I complained about student apathy and asked for either some action or suggestions and all that happens is that two letters come in-one offering more complaints and another offering the statement that things are nice the way they are. When are we going to stop bitching and/or smoothing things over and begin doing something about it? True, the apathy that plagues any educational institution from those who are grade hungry plagues us here. But, why is everyone afraid of setting up a student power? We cannot be denied of this! Must we continue to follow orders as Mr. Lace suggests? Are we that "brainwashed?" Why can't we have meaningful discussion--remembering to hear both sides?

For after all, is everything offered here just so much "bullshit?" I don't think so! The letter from Mr. Sabatelli had some good points--but like Mr. Lace's letter, it didn't go far enough. Mr. Sabatelli mentioned that there is room for improvement but as is typical, he failed to mention where. Mr. Lace, again the typical complainer, asks us to "find out why..." to "start looking around...," to "start asking questions...," to "observe," and to "start moving." Move where, for God's sake? Is

no one to offer suggestions?

Let me first make my position clear. I feel that the basic course work we get here is necessary to a successful ministry-but I deeply object to the danned gradegame that is played. Perhaps grades are necessary-but is the intense competition just as necessary? Is it necessary to simply regurgitate on tests? Or do we have room for some self-expression? As an example, in Christian Theology last quartermy final exam most certainly was not a regurgitation of what was said in class--it was my personal feelings, and whether or not the prof. agreed with me was of no issue. I doubt that he did agree -- but I wrote it anyway -- and I far from failed. So there are most certainly possibilities on both sides.

To get the ball rolling, if anyone gives a darm at all, I challenge both faculty and students to an open dialogue on courses, content, purpose, goals, possibilities for changes, etc. at a suggested time. If interested, contact me through campus mail % The Seminarian. Thus a suggestion has been offered, -- a challenge has been

made- - - Sounds of Silence? - - - Again?

Chapel attendence is hitting the usual mid-year low. Thanks to Middlers and Juniors who faithfully attend. Why not see what's going on!!??!!


The Norwegian A.F. was seen on maneuvers in Dr. Tappert's class this week.
