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IRESULTS

The results of the Joint Commission Meeting have been printed in the form of minutes, so it is now possible to accurately report the final action of the Joint Commission. The Commission passed a resolution that:

"1. The Philadelphia and Gettysburg Seminaries continue to function with the closest kind of structured cooperation with each other to produce the most effective theological education in the east, specifically by the development of a new memorandum of understanding which would provide for joint programs and planning and methods of administration, moving in the direction of a unified thrust in Lutheran theological education.


2. Each Seminary be urged to plan new, varied, and imaginative programs of theological education, including meaningful relationships with other schools of higher education and especially with other schools of theology.

3. Each Seminary be encouraged to carry out its program at its present location or at a unilaterally chosen new location."

This motion was unanimously carried.

Another motion which should be of interest to concerned students was to "deposit all the materials of the Joint Commission in the library of the Lutheran Theological Semimary at Philadelphia." It was understood that the material would be available for reference.

At the Executive Committee Meeting on Tuesday, January 27, several matters were considered. Carl Shankweiler announced that there was a new dryer in the laundry, and there is the possibility of new washers too. Carl also brought up the problem of long distance phone calls on the free phone. After some discussion the Committee decided to put a new system of fines into effect. Any long distance in which the person notifies John Schweitzer, telephone chairman, or Carl Shankweiler, will only be required to pay twice the amount of the phone bill. Long distance calls which are not reported, necessitating tracing of the call, will cost the caller \$10 in addition to the amount of the call. Hopefully long distance calls will not be made from the free phone, except in an <u>extreme</u> emergency.

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A report of the Joint Commission procoolings was given, and is included in this issue of the <u>Seminarian</u>. Also, letters addressed to the Board of Directors was read, in which the minutes of the Board meetings were requested for the Student Body, so that we could be better informed of the proceedings of the Board. Student representation at Board meetings and on any committees that might be formed to consider the future of the seminary. To date, the final request has been granted, (see the article in the opposite column) and the other two metters are pending.

Steve Bomgren is going to help coordinate informal get togethers with other seminaries. Philadelphia Divinity School initiated this attempt, and any concerned student should contact Steve. (See the Hagan Hall Bulletin Board for more information)

The students who are on committees studying the Seminary for the American Association of Theologycal Schools team which will visit the campus next Fall have reported that their meetings are beginning, and student opinion is welcome. The representatives for the Curriculum -Instruction Committee are: Eltón Grunden, Bill Munz, and Bill Berglund. Library - Faculty Committee, Grant Wickert, Barry Ridge, and Arlene Gibson; and on the Student Services-Physical Plant Committee: Marty Roth, Dean Bickel, and Hank Beljcan. Reports from these committees should be given to the Student Body soon.

A final matter discussed was the loss by a Junior of his Synod's approval. Since other trouble has been rumored from this Synod, a special Committee was set up to look fully into this matter, and to recommend action by the Executive Committee and the Student Body. As more concrete information becomes available, with more facts, students will receive a full report.

SHANKWEILER SPFAKS OUT,...

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1. A new clothes dryer has been installed in the Main Dorm laundry room. This new (for us but really used) dryer has a far greater capacity than the old one did, and for only 25¢ a person can expect to dry, at least to a reasonable extent, two washing machine loads of clothing. When using the dryer, be certain to take into consideration the heat selection lever in the upper, right-hand corner.

These regulations also apply to the free phone in Graduate Hall. After this date no exceptions will be made to these regulations whatsoever, unless a long distance call is made for official Student Body business <u>and</u> is first sleared by John Schweitzer.

Since my column last week, I have received numerous (not wverwhelming) but numerous, responses. Many from students, one from a student member of the student life committee and one from a faculty member.

From the student life committee: From what he told me, it seems that many of us are unaware of what is really happening with this committee. Many of the concerns mentioned last week and many other complaints I've heard have been or are being dealt with by the committee. Some of the topics before them are, housing for married students, course loads for juniors and middlers, sensitivity training, weekly communion, interest groups to discuss contemporary liturgy, student representation on the Academic Policy Conmittee, curriculun-- the lack of field experience at the beginning and the lack of content at the end, getting feedback from courses, and the possibility for seminar courses. And they have had some good results, -- communion is now being offered more frequently (the SLC in conjunction with Craig Tozzo's committee), sensitivity groups are being organized, course loads have been reduced (at least for middlors), and other dialogue is under way. Certainly these things take time-but it is good to know that some one is working on it. It would seem to me that as students we ought to take advantage of this channel of communication which is open to us-and hope that it works--but remembering that it can only work with our support. So let's try taking our concerns to this committee and give them concrete things to work on. For information -the student members are Martin Roth, William Munz, John Havrilla, and Barry Lace. Faculty are Charles Streich, John Kauffman, George Seltzer, and John Reumann.

From the faculty -- this faculty member is interested in engaging in dialogue with students. His concern is that the coffee break hour does not encourage this-even when faculty members do show up, they are limited to one table, as a rule. At present the St. is working things out with this prof. for dialogue-any suggestions as to time would be appreciated. Another suggestion form the prof. was for a weekly open-ended dialogue with a faculty member--or bi-weekly or monthly.

Thus things are looking up--those of you who are concerned must respond and support these possibilities if anything is to develop. St. Alphonsus Liguori

There are many routes available to the enthusiast setting out to ride the trolley for the first time. For instance, he can confine himself to one line, and simply ride it to the end and then catch the next car back to or near his starting point. However, this method is not always satisfactory, especially when one is not at all familiar with either the city of Philadelphia or the SEPTA streetcar system. It is quite possible that one get stuck in a swamp in Southwest Philadelphia, to give just one example, with no car back for several hours (route 36). Therefore, the beginner would be wise to follow a perscribed routing the first few times out; with the passing of time he will gain a feeling for the various routes, (Liniengefühl) and thus be able to set out on short, meaningful excursions of his own. For this reason we shall in the space remaining (ever notice how this column always goes to the bottom of the page, sort of like a trolley going to the end of the line?) outline a trolley trip for the interested Anfänger.

We begin our trip at the corner of Germantown and Allen's Lane at the pole marked "Car Stop". We wait on this corner until a car appears (the amount of waiting time is anywhere between two minutes and two hours, depending on the time of day and the conditions up and down the line) and, making sure the destination sign does NOT say GTN-GORGAS we get on the thing. Pay fare (35¢ in EXACT change) and find yourself a seat, if the car is not already packed full. Put another nickel in the machine and get another transfer (The whole system of fares and transfers is a complex one, and will not be dealt with here). Now ride the 56 car to 6th. and Erie. Remember to bow your head each time another trolley passes in the opposite direction. Now get off at 6th. St. and wait on the corner where it says "Car Stop" for a route 50 car. "I THINK JENSEN AND KOONS ARE NUMMIES * WHAT'S A NUMMY?"

LETTER:

To the Editor --

I was very interested in the letter or perhaps it was an article, which Mr. Koons wrote in your paper last week. I guess what impressed me most was the strong feeling that went into it, along with the seeming lack of thought. The first criticism was "no knowledge of what occurred." It was my responsibility to report on the results of the meeting, and although I told many students that the merger was not to be, I refused to give a written report until I could do so accurately from the minutes of the meeting. Unfortunately it took longer than one day to get the minutes out, so the report for the paper had to wait until this week.

What disturbed me more however, was the suggestion that the failure of the commission to recommend merger to the Boards of Directors (the Boards of the two seminaries had the final say as to merger, not the Joint Commission) was due to "petty" reasons or "dirty politics". Fortunately that is not so. The men of both sides had integrity, and believed that one location or the other was not suitable for good theological education. Different factors were stressed by both sides, and unfortunately a formula for bridging the gap was not found. Did Mr. Koons ever stop to think that it might be fortunate that someone did care where we went to do theological education, and tried to see the types of opportunities that were available? I happen to care where I go for my education, and I believe that other students do too. The fact that neither Gettysburg or Philadelphia f would go just anywhere means that the men thought that their philosophy of education did matter, and that the welfare of students was important.

"Wouldn't it be great if the students of Mt. Airy and Gettysburg got together..." Unfortunately I think even this is assuming too much, for as the opinion polls (which should be distributed too all students today) will show, the Gettysburg students are happy to stay right where they are, and do theology in Gettysburg. I really do not think that even the students could _ get together since they too have their own ideas about what is necessary for education.

Therefore Mr. Koons, I can respect your opinion, but I cannot understand your reasoning on this matter. Don't you really care about what style of theological education we have in the future?

Larry V. Smoose I hope, John, that you do not take this letter as a personal attack, but I think it is important that we understand the position of the Commission, and realize that these men worked very 'hard for merger. They simply could not in good conscience come to a decision to merge, and both sides were aware of this and regretted it. Is this worse than giving up anything just to merge? I do not think so.
