All parking spaces on the main driveway beside the refoctory and behind Graduate Hall with the exception of spaces 116-127 have been assigned. Commuting students are not assigned parking spaces but may use spaces $116-127$ behind Graduate Hell. When these spaces are already occupied, commuters must park on the street.

The following rules will be enforcod in ordor to keep parking problems to a minimum:
I. Between 7:00 A.M. Monday and 5:00 F.M. Friday the only students ' cars permitted to park on the campus parking lots are those assigned to specific spaces, and each car must be parkod only in its assigned space. The following exceptions are permitted:

1. Commuters may use spaces $116-127$ on the Graduate Hall lot, except on Thursdays, when they must be left vacant for the Graduate School.
2. An unassigned car may be parked in a numbered space with the permission of the student assigned to that spacc and of the shoriff, or with the permission of the sheriff in the absence of the person assigned to the space.
3. If an unauthorized car is parked in a student's assigned space, the student may park in a "visitor's" space, but should notify the sheriff and move as soon as his space is vacated.
II. The following system of fincs will bc used in order to onforce the above regulations:
4. 1st Warning
5. 2nd Warning
6. Fine of $\$ 1.00$
7. Fine of $\$ 5.00$
8. Prohibition of operating and/or parking a motor vehicle on campus for the remainder of the acadomic year. (continued on page 4)
