Dear.Mr. Koons:
A reply to your open letter to me printed in the Sominarian of November 4, 1970 is appropriate, and I would request that you print it in full in the next issue of your publication.
Your letter contains observations which are (a) personal and (b) substantive. I don't believe that discussion of the first category is fruitful either in open letters or in correspondence over a couple of hundred miles, so I will confine these remerks to the secund part of the eontent.

1. I quite ubvicusly do not know if $100 \%$ of the Bcard of the Seminary is frustrated about the failure_of the Gettysburg-Philadelphia merger. I do know that, in my fours $/ \mathbf{8 i c}$ of service on the Board, I have heard no Board momber privatoly or publicily/sic/ express even mild oppositicn to mergor. If you can site for me the names of Board membors who are opposed tc a Gettysburg-Philadelphia merger at a Philadolphia locatiun, this would ba helpful to me.
2. If you would talk at length with members of the faculty of the Philadelphia Seminary, you would discover that there are differences of opinion as to how "bost provide quality education" and there are serious differences among all of us in the theologicel enterprise of the Lutheran Church as to the validity of thu origiral Bergendorf raport. A paper by Carl Hertz published fur or five years ago in the Lutheran Quarterly was the first example of sericus substantive questions raised

## to that report.

3. Occasionally my prose is a bit opaque. What I meant to say abcut the "prior question" is: Is there substantial unanimity of opinion abcut the shape which the church will take in the next decade or two?
4. I would suggest, from a positive point of view, that you understand thet I accept a book such as Hadden's "Tho Gathoring Storm in the Church" as one of the most sociologically scund analysos of the issues that face us in the present and near future, and equally sound in terms of its description of options opon to us.
5. If you would be interosted in understanding how my intellectual development has beon affected over the years by my taachers, I w uld suggest thet you examine the work of B. Paulsen, C. Wright Mills, Kingsley Davis, N. Cantor,
and S. Lipsit. While I did have the privilege of studying under R. Morton, he has novor made any significant impact on my thinking.
6. The reasun why I stoppod beck from the "university related, urban oriented, ocumonical" criteria of the BNE plan is two fold:
(a) I wish to doal with those criteria in a subsequent mailing to she constituancy; (b) If you would discuss thase criteria with mumbors of the faculty for the Philadolphia Sominary, you will disccuor that thoy kncw, as I dc, that these is substantial disagreement as to what thase words mean when we get down to the implumonting of them. For instance: "ecumenical" is defined by various persins as "co-location with another sominary"; "location in closo proximity to other seminarios"; "a cluster of at least five sominaries of difforont traditions"; "partial crossragistration of students and faculty"; "total cross-registration of studionts and faculty", otc.
7. What I am working up tc in this surios of communicaticns to the constituency (and I will let you in on the big secret) is that, unless I miss by bets, the ultimato soluticn that we come up with (whatevor it may bo) will not fulfill all of these critoria, and wo had bottor stert recognizing it right now.
8. If you duubt that it is pcssiblo that a singlo sominary would not be chcaper than two, I rufer you to o memorandum from Lylo Schaller ciatod June 1, 1970 (e ecpy of which I onclusc with this lettor for your study). LThis ciccument is available in my rcom for anyono intorcsted.

If you have any other sabstantive questicns, or if my attempt at clarificoticn above
is not clear, I am perfoctly happy to contribute to a cialcg that would illuminate.

The opinions expressed in this Seminarian.


I feel that there has been a lack of othical sunsitivity. Despite the sincere efforts of presidonts, chairmen of boords and commissions to hring about a merger and/or cluster of thoolcgical schools, we have failed, and in a sanse wo have not been foithful in our respensibility to provide the best possible theclogical oducation, nor heve we been faithful to thcse whom we serve and whe support us. Or seminarios cortainly do exist in the kingcom of the earth, a wholo with cur age of inducision, compromise, and plaralism. There are fow of us who do net foul chaus and coercion.

I seo a condemnetion upon cur inabilities, an in cur age whan we must be decisive and authoritative we can do this cnly by vontaring in the faith wo proclaim in Christ. If onyono should bo able to realize our guilt, to be of ons will in order to overceme this condemnation, it shoul be the Church who knows rodumptien through a willingness to act in faith. Our lock of octivity is a lock of sensitivity.

This fact has prompted my opinion that we should move frem this thumb-sucking womh, with all of its sentimental heritege and ottachments. I dc not feel that geographical location per so is ultimately at issue, concurrent with what others have steted. It is not the buil lings or commenity of Mt. Airy which is the besis and security of our teaching ond dcing theology, but rather it is the Gospel and confessiens of our Church, the Word of Gou and the secraments which give us the hope and freedom in which to live. This is a time whun we must do theclogy, when the church must innovative and anabling. Thus, a change of location or asseciation dous not undianger our thenlogical educction, but may provide a new setting, a new confrontation, especially in a university oriontation, with the loouing minds and thoughts of our day. We might have a lessun to leorn from Abraham -- a venturing of frith.

At the root of -11 theolegy and the expression of faith is the need for confession, for opon lines, for trust, for willingness to listen to our Lord and tc one ancther. Perhaps the Rev. Mr. Porry is
the neecied change, the fresh air; but, preceding any mirocle is the confessional prayer for courage and the willingness to sheru in this act of foith. At leact fcur years, that I have known, of indocisiveness brings airporetc guil and insonsitivity upon us all, net on peosidovts, chairmen, or cormissions of the "Institution." Aleination scoms to be more and more irroconcilable. My desire is te feel o newness, a decisiveness that will give us freedom to venture in an attitude of confossion, willingmoss, and undorstanding, rathar than to have o will imposed upon us.

If you foel that this lottur snys nothing and is tho rambling of apothotic iscnioritis, then my only ploa is to look around you and please help mo to pick the log out of my own eye.

Aftor f ur wouks if crientation $y$ ou w uld havo throe munths of practical werk in the of the institutions, followed by pastoral work aithor at Bothel cr in a city congrognti $n$ in nearby Biclofold. Ycu may enroll for ene sumester in the Theological Schocl, gecting a tasto of Germon theclegical studies and ecntact with Gormon students, whe ere also ding prectical werk at Bethel. There will be cpportunity for a study tur ti places of ecclesiostical interust in Germany (c.g., Evangelical Acadomics), France(Taizo) cr Holland.
