Last Thursday after the Board of Directors meeting I had the opportunity to meet our new President, Dr. John D Newpher. The meeting wasquite accidental, but

the results of that meeting give me encouragement about next year. Dr. Newpher, who began his job officially as President of the Seminary, will be installed in that office at Commencement, Friday, May 14, 1971. The service is being held at 11:00 a.m. in Christ Lutheran Church, Pennsylvania and Rech Avenues, Oreland, Pa., Dr. Newpher's former parish.

Pastor Newpher is the first full-time president the seminary had since December of 1962. He is a graduate of Muhlenberg College and 1945 alumnus of the seminary. Dr. Newpher served a teaching fellowship here and was rewarded the STM degree in 1946. In 1958 he received his doctorate in systematic theology from Temple University.

Parishes which have called Dr. Newpher pastor are Ascension Church, Philadelphia; Christ Church, Camden, New Jersey; and the Audenried-Beaver Meadows Parish in Pennsylvania; as well as Christ Church in Oreland, Pennsylvania. He is now the chairman of the Examining Committee of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Synod.

We are locking forward to working with Dr. Newpher. We hope to be able to set up weekly discussions with our new president to help keep the student body informed of any information pertinent to the students. <u>The Seminarian</u> wishes to take this opportunity to extend its modest facilities to Dr. Newpher for his use. Dr. and Mrs. Newpher are planning to move onto campus soon. We want to take this chance to welcome Dr. Newpher to the seminary community. We are all looking forward to a profitable year ahead working with our new president.

130ARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING!!

Last Thursday, April 29, the Board of Directors of the Seminary held its second meet. ing of 1971. Seated among the august members of the board were two students, David Alderfer and myself. Some significant actions were taken which I would like to report. I will try to withhold editorializing about any of the decisions.

Three student initiated proposals were presented to the board. The first concerned the "memorial of the Class of 1971". This memorialization was presented to the faculty and student body earlier this year. It begins by stating a number of grievances about the lack of student involvement in decision making processes here at Mt. Airy. It proposes the study of the possible implementation of a "representitive body made up of equal representation of students, faculty and board members"; this body would be the "highest administrative body of the school". At its last meeting, the student body acting on this memorial passed a resolution calling for the establishment of a committee to study the feasability of setting up such an administrative body. Five students were to be placed on this committee and recommendations were sent to the faculty and board asking them to select an equal number of people from among themselves to serve on this study committee. The faculty recently acted on this and selected five members to serve on this committee. At Thursday's meeting the board agreed to send five members to this committee for "negotiations about the memorial of the class of 1971".

A second student proposal concerned plans to be set up in experimental activities in community involvement here on campus. Students requested that a janitor and security guard be hired by the seminary to make the opening of campus buildings for such programs possible. This would require an expense of \$13,000. This recommendation was approved by the board. They added a motion which called for President Newpher "to assume responsibility for coordinating the experimental activities set forth in the student proposal".

Thirdly, a petition was presented calling on the board to take action to retain the services of Dr. Howard Stone on the faculty. The petition was signed by 74 students and was accompanied by an explanatory letter by Student Body President Bill Rosevear. The adopted the following motion in regard to this:

MOTION: That the Executive Committee, in view of a petition of some students relating to the retention of Dr. Howard Stone as a member of the teaching staff, urge the faculty to take into consideration in its programming studies the possible curricular implications of the petition while denying the specific request of the petition. CARRIED.

In addition to student proposals, the board took some actions of importance or interest to students. It approved some campus improvements, including improved lighting in the library and outside grounds of the school.

Much time was spent during the meeting discussing the future of the seminary and its program since it now oppears that it is not possible to locate in either West Philadelphia or on the campus of P.D.S.
