

COURSES NEXT SEMESTER:

Dr. White: 602 Ministry in Church and Community

This course is required for M. Div. students as a part of the sequence of courses in pastoral theology. First semester, second year, four units of credit. MAR students may elect to take this.

The parish, understood as a voluntary association, is used to focus the social ministr of the church. The course gives assistance in the development and in the testing through field assignments of a style of pastoral ministry which attends to the variety of structure which comprise the complex society of urban man and to the issues which demand the church's social concern.

Using the field placement setting each student will develop a case analysis of the ministry in that church and community. A strategy for social ministry within that social context will be developed.

Readings will include: Berger, <u>The Sacred Canopy</u>; Schaller, <u>The Change Agent</u>; Hadden, <u>The Gathering Storm in the Churches</u>; Gustafson, <u>Treasure in Earthen Vessels</u>.

Dr. Lazareth: 560 Sex, Love and Life

Prerequisites: Christian Ethics 503, evening sessions, wives welcome

A comparison of Protestant and Roman Catholic approaches to the moral issues involved in current borderline cases in biomedical ethics: abortion, artificial insemination, birth control, euthanasia, homosexuality, organ transplants, sterilization, suicide. Readings, reports, discussions.

Drs. Lazareth and Aden: Pastoral Counseling in Ethical Dilemmas

Limited to senior students. Ways of enabling persons to make responsible decisions as Christians in facing crisis situations, employing actual experiences encountered in the intership year. Readings, reports, verbatims, role play, discussions.

Dr. Tappert: 421 History of American Christianity

Prerequisites: Successful completion of orientation course #401, Perspectives in Church History.

Christianity in America, and how it has come to be what it is today, will be studied by a variety of methods: reading, lectures, reports, discussion.

Dr. Bornemann: The Book of Genesis

Prerequisites: Hebrew 352 (or its equivalent).

A study of the thought of Genesis on the basis of the Hebrew text. Reading of key passages with special attention to the exceptical method.

Depending on background and facility in Hebrew, the class may be sectioned.

f.All articles appearing in this paper must have the name of the author accompanying it. The name may be withheld, however, if sufficient reason is presented to the editorial staff to do so.


g. The editorial staff reserves the right to reject or edit any material submitted.

Visitor: Benjamin the Cat, "The Plague"

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Last week we left you more or less stranded in the swamps of Eastwick, trying to figure out why a streetcar line (route 36) would end in the middle of a swamp. The only explanation we can offer is: at one time this line ran to Chester, Pa. When the Chester line was abandoned, it was decided to keep the line as far as Eastwick. The loop for this reduced-lenght line was then located in the swamp, since there was no place for it in the streets of Eastwick. The fact that almost noone lives in Eastwick is immaterial, because: a) The line may someday be extended to the airport, which is nearby; and b) With current plans to locate the Bicentennial in these swamps, the line may become a vital link between the rest of Phila. and the Bicentennial. Be that as it may, it is time to move on to better things. Take the 36 back to city center. Walk several blocks to 5th Str., where a route 50 car will be waiting to take you to North Phila. Option: visit Independence Hall at 5 & Chestnut, local tourist attraction, which nevertheless cannot hope to compete with route 50 so far as drawing crowds is concerned. (It is significant that every schoolchild who visits Ind. Hall also gets to see a trolley, sort of a donum superadditum.) Take the 50 to Girard Ave. and transfer to route 15 eastbound. Enjoy a ride over $\frac{1}{2}$ mile of new track (1969) at the Del. Expy. exit, past the headquarters of the Standard Feather Co. Have fun riding through Port Richmond, notice how at this point the line serves absolutely no one, since there are no houses in sight. Stay on the car to the end of the line, and transfer to route 60, which shares the loop with route 15. It is here that the old Richmond Depot was once located, (see SEMINARIAN, Str. Spl. vol. 33, nos. 7 & 16), but this august edifice, which in its latest capacity housed a tire warehouse, has since been torn down, and an insignificant filling station stands on its erstwhile sight. Take the 60 and enjoy the ride through the Polish splendor of Richmond. Note the three Catholic churches right next to each other (we can't figure out how it happened either!) Option: Visit the Ave Maria room at St. Lavislowrski's. Stay on the 60 until you reach Kensington Ave. Now prepare to bail out, but this will have to wait until NEXT WEEK.
