At the last student body meeting on Wednesday, November 1, 1972, the bookstore committee recommended and the student body adopted the following statement:

- A. That all accounts with the bookstore be settled before the end of each semester. Failure to do so would result in holding of grades and loss of privilege to charge books until the account is settled.
- B. That the \$50.00 deposit be required at the beginning of both scresters before students are allowed to use the charge privilege.

Both sections of this statement are present so that the bookstore may better serve the students and faculty. In the past, the bookstore has always felt the pinch for rady cash during the second senester. Due to this, new books could not be ordered and this hold over into the fall.

In light of recent discussions concerning the bookstore, this move is an effort to better manage the bookstore, with the hope of being able to continue to justify keeping the bookstore in student hands.

The cormittee is also looking for applicants for the position of ass't. manager. Applications can be secured from the bookstore committee chairman. Two applicants will be selected to work from January to mid-April as clerks (of sorts). In mid-April, one of the two will be chosen as ass't. manager, to be groomed by the present manager to take over in September. Again, this action is taken to better insure continuity in the bookstore, to better effect a good store in the fall.



" TO STUDY OR NPT TO STUDY"

Last week we sallied forth upon an attack on curtain institution's implicit emphasis upon a sertain mode of study. Unfortunately, I recieved response (directly) only from one professor. The students whom I talked to, though, were very enthusiastic about my attack. there are certain abuses upon the methods of study...any student can point these out. But abuses should not create in the students a self righteous rationalization of non-study.

In my contact with the pastors of the North West Lutheran Parish, I have found that almost to a man they desire a continuing program of study especially in exegusis, language, and pastoral counseling. Exegesis is not a process that becomes more and more impotrant in the lif of a parish pastor especiallyin preaching. What is taught at the seminary is not academicnonsense; in the main part it is vital to any ministry. apparent inability to memorize certain biblical facts stems not from the obscurity of the facts, but from the lack of personal experience of what those facts me n existentially. This personal experience cannot be gained second band in the classroom. It can only be gotten from the living. Classroom work must speak to t e experiences of the student; if not, classroom work becomes facts of memorization. Wlassroom work is not irrevelant, rather its I revalency will not be really known and experienced until the student is out in the parish.

Sometimes though, irrelevant facts creep in. These f acts are not really irrelevent they just have a limited relevancy. The man in the parish does not have the time to become fluent in Greek & Habrew. He can't become a pro.-Scholar. Facts that pertain to linguistic & exegetical scholars will never really be known by the students. (to know you must experience).
