PERSPECTIVE

There has been a lot of talk during the past year or so on the idea of the seminary as a community. I think most of us have come to realize that though the phrase is indeed apt, it is not meant to imply that we necessarily have a lot in common as individual members of the community. Hence different activities may draw different people, and in varying numbers, yet none can be rightly deemed failures when enjoyable or beneficial to those present. In fact the community is present at all activities, even when the number present is relatively small. Validity is not dependent upon number. Another idea embodied in that of the "seminary community" is that of many smaller communities within the larger one. These may be informal groups of students who all share a particular interest, or they may be more specialized.

One rather specialized group is the wives of the undergraduate students. We are a motley group, most working, some studying, some raising families. Perhaps all we really have in common is husbands who are studying theology. Since this in itself poses particular marital and social problems, there has been formed for many years a club for our mutual interest and consolation. We met on September 19th for the purpose of organizing for the current school year. Rather than elect officers, since most of us are strangers to each other, we formed a committee of four volunteers who will try to organize in a way that will interest many women. We spent most of the evening discussing what we would like to do at various meetings, and what we want our club to be this year. Some of the ideas were a tasting party (an annual event), a book review, a progressive dinner, a discussion and learning session on natural childbirth, and a continuation and updating of a "bargain-hunters guide to Philadelphia." We discussed the problem of communication and determined to set up a telephone chain so that everyone who wishes to be informed of our events can be. If you were not at the meeting and want to be included, or if you have any ideas or questions, please call any of the committee members, listed below. If you want to be a part of wives' club, we welcome your ideas. For myself, I think that not only is the club a good place for group meetings, projects, or whatever, but it is a good place to get to know other women, and hopefully develop a few close relationships which can be kept through the future, after we have all left Mt. Airy.

The thought of the future for which our husbands are preparing brings us to the other thing that we do have in common. We will all be pastor's wives some day. Have you given any thought to what that means? Perhaps it does not mean anything special, although some questions do come to my mind when I think about it. Some are: Am I supposed to be a paragon of virtue? Do I have to be involved in the church my husband serves, and to what degree? Do I have to entertain the council or other committees? Is there a "role" into which I must fit? To what extent must I conform to the congregation's image of a "good pastor's wife?" What if I work, or pursue my own higher education? How does this affect my family? Does it affect my husband's work? Should it? Then there is the whole question of motherhood. Many of the faculty wives have been pastor's wives, and most wives of seniors have at least some experience from internship. We thought it fit to start the year for wives' club with a discussion of this topic, so we have set our next meeting for October 10th, Wednesday at 7:30 pm. At that time we will take up this question, probably breaking up into small groups in order for everyone to be able to participate. We invite those with parish experience to come and share the experience you have had. We will meet at Joyce Laskey's home at 4367 Cresson St. We plan to leave from the seminary, time to be announced, as it takes about twenty minutes to get there. If you can drive, please let us know. We will be in touch with you to find out if you are planning to go.

As I said earlier, different activities interest different people. We think this meeting will interest all the wives, but we do not know your mind. Please feel free to come to wives' club whenever the activity of the evening interests you, but you need not feel any less a member if you do not or cannot attend every meeting, or even very often. One final note: if you are interested in biblical education, Drs. Bornemann and Krodell are holding lectures in Old and New Testament on three successive Tuesday evenings at 7:30 pm in Hagan Hall especially for wives. The dates are October 23rd, 30th, and November 6th.

Happy New Year! Tuesday morning we had a half-hour introduction to what could be a fast-moving year. We had nominations, an election passed three motions, and dispensed with \$1360.00.

Jim Jerge led his first Student Body meeting as President, Sue Moyer read her last set of minutes (hallelujah!), and the seniors had their meeting anyway.

We now have a budget for 73-74. The proposed budget was approved, including an increase in student dues from \$16.50 to \$18.00 for the year. This was necessary because this year we have a 3/4 - size student body with full - size ideas.

Elections will be held next week - 8 A.M. Monday October 1 through 5 P.M. Wednesday, October 3 in the mail room in Hegan Hall. Results will be printed in Thursday's Seminarian . The entire student body will be given ballots to vote for Vice - President (candidates: Bruce Davidson and Bob Young) and Secretary (candidates: Marc Brophy, Jeff Hedin, Warren Reichert, and Warren Sieber). The best of luck to all the nominees.

The Co-operative Bookstore Committee was sent a recommendation that they be allowed to hire an assistant manager for up to six hours a week. Also, the administration received a petition to drop all fees for overload courses taken for academic credit. When I receive a reply to this petition, the Seminarian will publish the report of what happened. The petition did include a count of the vote.

Congratulations to Walt Harrison, the newly-elected Student Body representative to the Seminary Community Committee and Worship Committee. Jim Jerge will soon appoint four other student representatives, which will bring student representation on the committee to five.

Ascension Church needs a basketball coach-see Jo Wilck or Pastor Freeman. The Social Activities Committee wants help planning the Coffee House - join Gary Carrier and Comm. Thursday (today) at 1:30 in the refectory. Bruce Davidson wants ideas and student opinion on " campus modernization" before the Construction Committee meets again Oct. 4. RENOVATIONS

As you might have heard, renovations are taking place on campus. Although there's not much to see yet, things really are underway. Last year a construction committee was set up to plan and oversee these renovations. The committee is made up of three members of the board of directors, the president of the seminary, the business manager, two faculty members (footnote: Dr. Kredel and Mr. Streich) one alumnus of the seminary, the contractor, the architect and his assistant and one student. That's me. This August body will hold another of its meetings on Thursday October 4th. If its anything like the other meetings, it will go on seemingly forever, and no matter how cold it is outside; they will not need to turn on any heat in that meeting room. Many of the building plans are still pretty much up in the air, and decisions on things like building use are still not settled. Much of what is discussed certainly has direct influence on students in the future, and I would like to represent the students in such a way that I'm sure the building plans will reflect their needs. However, so far my most significant contribution to the planning is probably that I helped convince the committee that closets 24 inches wide are probably not big enough. So I think I need your help. I'd like to discuss plans with you. Perhaps you'll have some suggestions or questions about them, or perhaps you'll see some things that need to be looked into, or concerns about things like married student housing that need to be examined. In a recent discussion with the junior class, people pointed some things out which I had missed, and will now take to the committee. Perhaps with a few more people's help I'll have a little more input. I'll be in the refectory with the plans this Tuesday after chapel (and after a short class meeting) and I'll bring them again on Wednesday during coffee break. If anyone's interested in discussing them, we can do it then. We might not come up with anything earth-shattering, but then again, maybe we might. In any case I think it's worth the effort, because judging from the past, the seminary is going to have to live with what we plan to do for many, many years in the future.

Volunteers from the Seminary Community are needed to help conduct a mass survey of the Chestnut Hill area on Saturday October 27. The survey is being sponsored by Christ Lutheran Church and Northwest Philadelphia Lutheran Parish, and will be used mainly to find the unchurched in the community. The results of this survey will then be used to establish a visitation and involvement program by the congregation, which could be a crucial element in the future survival of the congregation. Volunteers will be asked to canvass the neighborhood, filling out a brief questionnaire with each person visited. The day will begin with a survey strategy meeting from 9:30 to 10:00, the canvass itself following from about 10:00 to 12:30. The day will be concluded with a home-made lunch served at the church to all volunteers. As it stands now volunteers are being recruited from churches in NPLP and from Christ Church. Dr. William Jansen, president of SE Pennsylvania Synod will also be participating in the survey. Since about 70 people are needed to conduct the survey effectively, it is hoped that we can get about 20 people from the seminary community. Your help is urgently needed in this, so if you are able to help, please call Pastor Bill Jansen (CH 2-9189) and let him know you're coming. Anyone with a question can talk to either Bruce Davidson or Dick Niewohner who work with the congregation. You can help a congregation looking to grow and strengthen itself by helping in this survey.

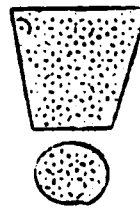

For the "womens news" recipes, which are quick, easy and inexpensive, poems, helpful hints, things you want to share.

Helpful Hints

To separate two glasses that are stuck together, fill the inside glass with cold water and set the outer glass in warm water. They will separate easily in a few minutes.

You can substitute yogurt for sour cream in recipes.

Use a regular size ice cream scoop when a recipe calls for 1/4 cup of shortening.

Hamburg Straganoff

- 1 c. minced onion
- 1/4 c. butter
- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 clove garlic or garlic/salt
- 1 can cream/chicken soup or cream/mushroom soup
- 2 tbs. flour
- 2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 1 can sliced mushrooms
- 1 can sour cream

Brown onions in butter until tender - stir in remaining ingredients except soup and sour cream.

Brown for 5 minutes. Add soup, simmer uncovered for 10 minutes. Just before serving stir in sour cream. Serve on noodles or rice etc.

White Sauce: cream 1 c. oleo. 1 c. flour - pat into pan or ice cube tray and freeze. Cut into 16 cubes. To make 1 c. white sauce pour 1 c. milk into sauce pan, add 1 cube and stir till thickened on low heat. Makes 1 c. medium white sauce.

To make sour milk or sour cream, add 1 tbs. vinegar or lemon juice to a cup of milk and let sit for 5 minutes till it curdles.

Escalloped Carrots

- 12 med. carrots
- 1/4 c. butter
- 1 sm. onion, diced
- 1/4 c. flour
- 1/4 tsp. dry mustard
- 2 cups milk
- Pepper, 1/4 tsp celery salt
- Buttered bread crumbs
- 1/4 # sl. Am. cheese

Melt butter in frying pan and saute the sliced carrots and onions (10 - 15 min.) Make a white sauce with flour, mustard and milk. Layer the cheese and carrots in a med. size greased casserole dish, beginning and ending with carrots. Pour the sauce over cheese and carrots and sprinkle top with bread crumbs. Bake at 350 degrees, 25 min.
