WOMEN'S PAGE

Cockeyed Cake

- 1 1/2 c. sifted flour
- 3 Tbs. cocoa
- 1 Tsp. soda
- 1 c. sugar
- 1/2 Tsp. salt
- 5 Tbs. cooking oil
- 1 Tbs. vinegar
- 1 Tsp. vanilla
- 1 c. cold water

Put your sifted flour back in sifter, add cocoa, soda, salt, sugar and sift this right into greased square cake pan (9x9x2"). Now make 3 grooves in this dry mixture. Into one, pour the oil; into next the vinegar; into next the vanilla. Pour cold water over all and beat it with a spoon till it's nearly smooth and you can't see the flour. Bake at 350 degrees for 1/2 hour. Cool and frost.

Cheese Pie

- Filling: Beat until smooth 4 sm. pkg. Phila. Cream Cheese, 1/2 c. sugar, 2 eggs. Pour into graham cracker crust pie shell, and bake for 20 min. at 375 degrees.
- Topping: Mix together 1 c. commercial sour cream, 1 Tsp. vanilla, 2 tbsp. sugar. Spread on top of pie after baking. Sprinkle with nutmeg and cinnamin. Bake 5 mins. longer. Cool and chill for at least 6 hrs. before serving.

Helpful Hints

- An envelop from which a corner has been snipped makes a handy funnel to fill salt shakers.
- To remove fruit or coffee stains from a tablecloth, pour boiling water held about 12" above cloth until the stain vanishes. Wash as usual.
- To remove burned food from a aluminum pans, fill pan with cold water, Add 1/4 cup vinegar and bring to a slow boil. Simmer 10-15 minutes.
- When baking, sift dry ingredients on a paper plate. It bends for easy pouring into mixer bowls.

Macaroni Sauté

- 2 c. macaroni (uncooked)
- 1/2 c. onion
- 1 c. green pepper
- 1 clove garlic minced
- 1 c. (6 oz.) Tomato paste
- 2 1/2 c. water
- 1 Tsp. salt
- 1/2 Tsp. pepper
- 2 Tsp. Worcestershire Sauce
- 1/2 c. oil

Sauté macaroni, onion, pepper, garlic in hot oil, until macaroni turns yellow. Add remaining ingredients and bring to a boil. Cover and simmer over low heat, approx. 20 minutes. Serves 6.

Beef Sauté - Sauté 1 lb. beef with macaroni and increase salt to 1 1/2 Tsp.

Edelweiss Fudge Pie (rich)

- 2 oz. German's sweet chocolate
- 1/2 c. butter
- 3 lg. eggs (about 2/3 c.)
- 1/2 c. sugar
- 1/2 c. firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 c. all purpose flour
- 1 Tsp. vanilla
- 1 c. whipping cream whipped

In med. sauce pan over low heat, melt chocolate and butter, stirring constantly until butter is melted and chocolate is softened. Cool to room temp. In lg. mixing bowl, beat 2 mins. - eggs until foamy. Add sugar and brown sugar. Beat at high speed 1 min. At low speed, blend in flour for 1 min. Add cooled chocolate-butter mixture, and vanilla; beat 1 1/2 min. at med. speed; until well combined. Pour into a well greased 9" pie pan. Bake at 325 degrees 40 min. Cool. Pie puffs up when baking then settles down to a nice fudgy goodness. Serve with whipped cream. Can add 1/2 c. chopped nuts to mixture.

don't feast off the fat of the land

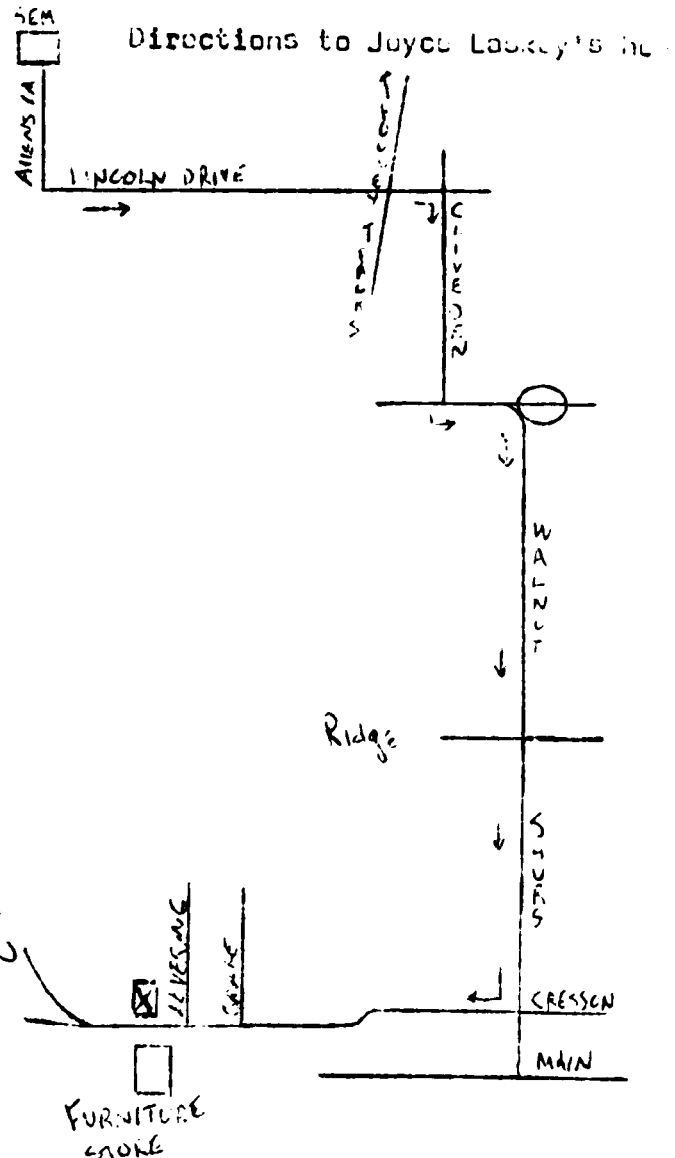
without planting seeds for our harvest.

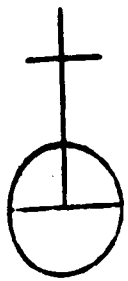
