-- To remove fruit or coffee stains from a tablecloth, pour boiling water held about 12" above cloth until the stain vanishes. Wash as usual.

--To remove burned food from a aluminum pans, fill pan with cold water, Add 4 cup vinegar and bring to a slow boil. Simmer 10-15 minutes.

If you can remember back to that year - America was at undeclared war in Scutheast Asia. Most of my class-mates began their protest speech with a short demonstration. Many draft cards or copies of draft cards and flags were burned. Well, most of that is gone from the scene today. We seem to be in a complete state of apathy. Now, I'm not saying there should be all those demonstrations and ricts in which so many interested young Americans participated - but that very few people really stick to their original protest or view. They sink away into apathy, only to wonder how and why all the things that are happening now come to be. Politics and its prestitute politician has become a very shaded profession. 
