Sixteen Lutheran congregations and six Lutheran institutions in Northwest Philadelphia will join together for the first time in their history for a Reformation celebration and supper on Sunday, October 28, at 3:30 P.M. at Messiah Lutheran Church, 4400 N. Broad St.

Dr. Edward T. Horn, III, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, Germantown, liturgical expert in the Lutheran Church in America, has designed a program of worship which will include music by the Germantown-Stavens Academy choir. The Rev. Arthur W. Ebischbach, who is a Lutheran pastor in Matawan, N.J., will accompany the singing on his trumpet. The angel Gabriel is also expected to play along.

The Rev. Helmut Lehmann, Librarian at the Philadelphia Lutheran Seminary in Nt. Airy and editor of the American edition of Luther's Works, will be the preacher.

Lutherans, long famous for their singing, will begin the service informally with a hymn sing. At 4P.M. there will be a liturgical procession led by banners from each church taking part.

The Rev. Michael Merkel, host paster of Messiah Church, has announced that following the service there will be a buffet served under the direction of David Bishop. Angelic Gunk

1 large box vanilla instant pudding
 (or 2 small)

l pint sour cream

1 jar prepared cherry pie filling

1 9oz. angel food cake

Prepare pudding according to directions and allow to set at room temperature. Stir in sour cream, mixing well. Break cake into bite size pieces and use half to make one layer in large serving dish; speon half of pudding mixture evenly over cake; speon half of cherry filling over pudding. Repeat. Chill thoroughly.

Serves 8-10. (I prefer to use less cake and have a more custardy consistency)

Helpful Hints:

- . A small piece of stale white bread will rub out most ink or pencil marks on washable clothing.
- . When oriental-style recipes call for thin strips of meat, semi-freeze the meat first, then slice with a sharp knife.

Helpful Hints:

- Take a pin hole in one end of eggs before boiling. They will not crack open during cooking.
- when a recipe calls for solid vegetable shortening such as Crisco, an easy way to measure is as follows: If recipe call for ½ cup shortening, fill measuring sup half full of water. Add shortening in chunks until water reaches top of measuring pour off water.
 - Keep some stale gread on hand in your freezer. When a recipe calls for soft bread crumbs grate your frozen bread.
- Have you ever been frustrated trying to remove a piece of egg shell from a bowl? Take a half of empty shell and use as a scoop, it works like magic.
- To clean tarnished jewelry, use an old toothbrush and toothpaste. Wet the brush and scrub.
- A few marbles in the bottom of your double boiler or teakettle will rattle when water runs low.

JR. CLASS PROJECT

The members of the Junior class have been a part of the Seminary for almost two months. In that time, we have come to "know" just about everybody there is to know here. We have also become aware of course demands. Both of these have required adjustments on our part; it seems that this has been the case with almost all junior classes in the Seminary's history. But at the same time, we are a unique class. We as a class possess characteristics that set us apart. (For that matter, no two classes have been exactly alike.)

During the next four years, a lot of things are going to happen. Because of this we will change in many ways, still maintaining a uniqueness. With this in mind, a seven-member committee of the Junior class (four volunteers, three requested) has reached a decision to make an on-going record of the next four years in the life of our class. The final form of that record will be what is commonly called a "scrapbock" or classbook; a definite name and title have not yet been determined. The classbook will be composed of pictures, poems, and other types of memorabilia that collect over the next 2/50 of a century, of, by, and primarily for our class. The record will be the type of thing that can be looked at many years after seminary graduation and appreciated because of the memories it will hold. It should be mentioned here that the book will also record the physical renovation of the Seminary itself; our class is in the unique position of witnessing its complete renovation.

BOARD REPORT

The Board of Directors meeting of LTSP was held on Wednesday afternoon, Oct. 17 at 1:00 P.M. in the North Ballroom of the Ft. Washington Sheraton Unique. Dr. A.J. White opened the meeting with devotions. The minutes were read and approved. The Rev. Edward K. Perry was elected chairman on the first ballot with 19 votes. Dr. Newpher then presented his report:

1) Request for some additional funding for graduate and continuing education in the

Caribbean Synod. (An additional \$1500 has been added to the \$6000 alotted.)

2) Carl Adams' recommendation for a high tension primary power distribution

system. (Arthur Engineers is to do the necessary work.)

3) Recommendation regarding UCI - "As of July 1, 1974 the concerns of the UCI shall become a part of the continuing education and of services to symptom."

The report of the Dean, Dr. Krodel recommended an endorsement of the Doctor of Ministry program. The program, approved by the Board, will be sent to the state for accredit-dation.

The treasurer's report was approved.

The Rev. David Bremer proceeded with the recommendations and approvals for promotion:
Robert Hughes - Assistant Professor in Practical Theology, 3-yr. term from July 1
Charles Streich - Associate Professor in Practical Theology, w/out tenure, from July Richard Olson - 3-yr. term as Assistant Professor as of July 1.

A lengthy report was given by the Construction Committee.

It was motioned and passed to hold a a special student body meeting on Monday, October 29, 1973, in the refectory at 11:30 A.M. Students should be aware that this meeting will take the place of the small group meetings on this particular Monday. The primary concern of this meeting will be to redefine student priorities in regard to the future construction taking place on campus. It was also motioned and passed to have procedures taken to have the student body president become an ex-officio member of the construction committee of the LTSP.

Susan Moyer reported that there is over \$700 in the bank account. Jim Jerge presented a list of tentative appointments to the executive committee which consisted of various committee chairmen. This list was approved. A list of these appointments was sent out to all students this past Monday.

Dr. Newpher's reply to the student body to the request for the elimination of payment of fees for overload courses was read. A summary of his reply appeared in the October 18th issue of $\underline{\text{The Seminarian}}$.

The tentative date for the next executive committee meeting is set for November 19, 1973, at 6 P.M. in the basement of the Lutheran Church of the Ascension.

It does not. however, state what the students want included in Hagan. Limited time and strict adherence to parlimentary procedure prohibited discussion of this important issue. We propose that a student referendum be taken to establish prioities for facilities to be included in Hagan Hall.

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



Easy Coffee Cake

Topping:

2 Tables. butter (soft)

🖠 c. brown sugar

1 teasp. cinnamon

2 Tables. flour

Mix these together until blended

Batter:

Sift together 1½ c. sifted cake flour, 2 teasp. baking powder, ½ teasp. salt, 3/4 c. sugar.

Sift flour into creamed mixture

Add:

½ c. shortening

1 egg (unbeaten)

cup milk teasp. vanilla

Mix together until well blended. Spread batter in pan and sprinkle with topping.

Bake at 350 degrees for 25-30 min.
