During this academic year I will be serving, in conjunction with Dr. Newpher, as a liaison between the Seminary and those college students actively seeking or considering a seminary edu-The purpose of my work will be to assist these students with their concerns about theological education in general and to introduce them to Philadelphia Seminary in particular. These functions will be completed through several different approaches including written contact with each perspective seminarian, direct contact through a college campus visitation program by faculty/student teams, and on-campus contact as a result of either individual and group visits to Mt. Airy or the perspective student retreat planned for early Spring.

One difficult aspect of this job is obtaining the names of those persons who are in need of such a service. Through the supporting Synods of Philadelphia Seminary and select college chaplains in the Northeast, I hope to assemble a list of such individuals, yet I am aware that this approach might neglect some interested persons. We are celebrating the festival some Germans call the Octoberfest. A celeration that brings the best raspberrylaced beer, chocolate pretzels, and some of the world's most unusual and delicious sausages.

At last count, there were about 400 German wurst, ranging from tiny Weiswurste with a veal-based stuffing to a gooseliver sausage with truffles.

In case you don't know the four basic types of wurst here they are:

Rohwurst is cooked and smoked by the butcher and you can eat it right away.

Bruhwurst is both smoked and scalded by the butcher and may be eaten as is or heated by simmering.

Knochwurst which Americans in general know as cold cuts, may be smoked and is always well cooked before you buy it over the meat counter.

Last but not least there is Bratwurst which composer Victor Herbert is said to have ordered when he dined at his favorite restaurant in New York. Victor who??? Anyway, it is sold raw and must be panfried before eating. This tasty little wurst is made mainly from pork, sometimes with veal and livened up with a variety of spices, including nutmeg, caraway, majoram, and mace.

Well, just try and eat all 400 and we'll see you at the mortuary not the Octoberfest! Have a good wurst!

In years past, there has always been a Woman's Page on cooking and various articles pertaining to the culinary arts. We men have finally revolted. Up with Men's Lib! Who are the best chefs in the world? Why men! That is why Chef Cuisine will be writing for the Seminarian to give us the male point of view although when you think about it the female point of view is usually right.

Our first recipe will be my Carlos Cuisine Colossal Cheeseburger, served with delicious wine and it usually serves 5 or 6, unless you invited 12, in that case turkey you had better double this recipe.

 $1\frac{1}{2}$ pounds ground beef

cup chopped onion

teaspoon salt teaspoon pepper to 1 teaspoon chili powder 8 ounce can tomatoe sauce

2 (8 ounce) cans refrigerated Italian onion and garlic flavored crescent dinner rolls

1 cup (4 ounces) shredded Cheddar cheese

l Tablespoon milk Sesame seed

Preheat oven to 375. Grease 12-inch pizza pan. In large frying pan, brown ground beef and onion; drain. Stir in salt, pepper, chili powder and tomato sauce; simmer while preparing crust. Separate crescent dough into 16 triangles. Arrange 13 triangles around prepared pan spoke fashion, with narrow tips of triangles extending over pan edge about 5 inches. Press remaining triangles in center of pan to cover: seal perforations. Spread meat mixture over dough; sprinkle with cheese. Bring dough up over filling to center; pinch edges to seal. Brush with milk; sprinkle with sesame seed. Bake at 375 for 20 minutes to 25 minutes until golden brown and crust is no longer doughy. Serve with salad and Almaden Mountain Red Burgundy or Louis Martini Claret. Carlos Cuisine!

OFF THE DINNER TABLE

In order to facilitate an exchange of theological and professional ideas in the Seminarian, I will hope in the next issues of our paper to prod the faculty into an off-the-cuff response to questions I hear being asked by the students (remmbering of course that the questions I perceive are being reflected by an imperfect and clouded mirror).

In hot debate at the dinner table recently is a question directed at the Biblical professors. As a senior I would pose the question this way: How can I as a conscientious pastor and person actually preach on the miracle stories? There are many of them in the Gospels of the "C" year of our lectionary. That lines of rationale and faith do I use to climb into the pulpit with these pericopes as my guide? Do we talk in allegorical, mythological, metaphorical, analogical, physical, psychological, philosophical, rational, theological, biological or comical terms? Or do we, as the best of our realistic models in the parish, either pretend like they happened or change the subject?

I personally feel compelled at this time to deal with the miracles from the pulpit in a more physical sense, mainly because of the authority of the Gospels themselves and the needs of the people of the parish. At the same time I feel compelled to be honest to my Biblical academics in leading Bible study. This professional schizophrenia is a very uneasy and frightful position to take. I would appreciate some response to my anxieties and the anxieties of others that I am reflecting here. This inquiry is directed at the Biblical professors but maybe others would like to respond.
