LACK OF FIRE ALARMS-MAIN DORM; NEW WRM FORMING; SEMINARIAN VICTORY

Editorial: The first Student Body Meeting began Tuesday with President Zeiser slamming the gavel at 10:10 A.M. Mark Brophy read his minutes to an enthused crowd. Among the interesting accounts: a thank you to Dean Krodel for a job well done and a long list of candidates for that coveted office of the Presidency last term. Another interesting item was the purchase of an electric typewriter, for whom? A motion was passed to amend the budget for the Wives Club to \$35.00, it was passed. Another motion was made to take the excess \$40.00 originally proposed to the Wives Club and allot it to the new committee on Dialogue for Woman's Role in Ministry. (WRM) It was amended again that the money left over at the end of the year would be channeled to Social Ministry. The Budget was passed after some debate. Tom Cvammen reported that the Nominating Committee nominates for Vice-President: Bruce W. Potteiger and David B. Allen; also nominates for Secretary: James A. Shelly and Scott C. Schantzenbach. From the floor a favorite son was nominated, Rod Saylor but he respectfully declined. He was smart. The election will close at 11 o'clock on Friday. Don't forget to vote.

New Business: Sam Zeiser proposed that the Student Body elections take place in April and one week later the class election for the present Junior Class take place for their Middler year to come. This proposal will be voted on in the next Student Body Meeting. Frank Terhune proposed that the \$300.00 allotted for the mimeograph machine kept in the savings account be placed in the operating principle. Moving it from \$634.81 to \$934.00. The mimeograph machine was purchased from the operating principle by last years Middler Class. This motion was passed. Paul Beck voiced an opinion on the dangerous fire conditions in main dorm- wooden walls, floors, ceilings, no fire extinguishers, no alarm bell and no phones to call the fire company. It was also stated that the proper authorities had already been informed of this but no action has been taken. Tom Richards and Carl Mangold voiced a strong protest and formed a motion calling for action. The motion was withdrawn with the stipulation that Sam Zeiser and Rick Sebastian would immediately meet with President Newpher and Carl Adams. It seemed to be quite evident that the Student Body would not let this issue go unattended too. A motion was defeated to send the Seminarian to the Board of Directors, the vote: 36 opposed and 26 for. The Staff hopes that all those who wish to see a Seminarian printed every week and sent out to various groups will kindly help us do the job. I think it could be done if those 26 would help us. The last motion of the meeting came from our hard working President Zeiser and Rick Sebastian as they called for a New Constitution to meet the changing campus needs. Rick suggested a new committee headed by the new Vice-President get the job. The meeting was adjourned at 11:10 A.M.

CUISINE SPEAKS OUT

COOKING WITH BEER!

The English, Flemish, Swiss and last but not least the Germans drink beer, but they also cook with it. Here is a recipe called Belgian Beef Stew ala Carlos Cuisine I hope you appreciate!

It makes 6 servings! Pour boiling water over $\frac{1}{4}$ pound diced lean bacon and let stand for 1 minute, then drain. Put bacon and 1 tablespoon butter, margarine or lard into a large skillet. Cook until the bacon is limp and transparent. Add 20 peeled small white onions and 1 large clove of garlic, minced. Cook, stirring frequently, until they are golden. Transfer bacon and onions to a Dutch oven or flameproof casserole. Add 2 pounds boneless chuck or round, cut into $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch cubes, to the fat in the skillet, a few pieces at a time, and brown over high heat. Transfer the meat to the casserole. Stir in 2 tablespoons flour, 2 teaspoons salt and $\frac{1}{4}$ teaspoon freshly ground pepper. Add one 12-ounce can or bottle beer, preferably dark beer, to barely cover meat. Bring to boiling. Reduce heat and simmer, covered, for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours, or until meat is tender. Check for moisture and, if necessary, add a little more beer. Taste for seasoning and add more salt and pepper, if necessary. Remove Dutch oven from heat and stir in 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Serve with noodles and garnish with chopped parsley. Your beverage- you guessed it: BEER!

ingredients: 1oz. Bourbon, 1oz. Brown Cacao, 1oz. Cream,
recipe: Shake vigorously 1oz. Bourbon, 1oz. Brown Cacao, 1oz. Cream with cracked ice and strain into stem glass.

THE TAMPA TARPON

ingredients: $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Bourbon, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Triple Sec, 3oz. Orange Juice, 1 teaspoon of Sugar, Club Soda.
recipe: Shake $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Bourbon, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Triple Sec, 3oz. Orange Juice, 1 tsp. Sugar with ice. Pour into highball glass, stir in Club Soda. Garnish/Pineapple slice.

THE KANSAS CITY CUTIE

ingredients: 2oz. Bourbon, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. White Creme de Menthe, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Coffee Liqueur.
recipe: Stir 2oz. Bourbon, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. White Creme de Menthe, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Coffee Liqueur in rocks glass. Add ice and serve.

THE BALTIMORE BANG

ingredients: $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Bourbon, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Apricot Brandy, 1oz. Lemon Juice, 1 teaspoon of Sugar.
recipe: Shake with ice $1\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Bourbon, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Apricot Brandy, 1oz. Lemon Juice, 1 tsp. Sugar. Strain into sour glass. Garnish/cherry, orange slice.

THE MINNEAPOLIS HUSTLER

ingredients: 2oz. Bourbon, 1oz. Sweet Vermouth, 1oz. Orange Curacao, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Lime Juice.
recipe: Shake over cracked ice 2oz. Bourbon, 1oz. Sweet Vermouth, 1oz. Orange Curacao, $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. Lime Juice. Strain into stem glass.

Super Sundaes will be on sale in the library's rooftop cafeteria- "We supply the ice cream and toppings, you supply the creativity"- for 85 cents they say?

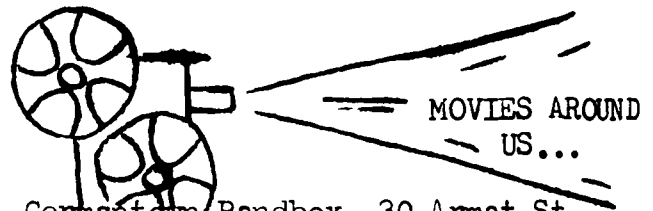
Admission to the Academy of Natural Sciences, 19th and the Parkway, will be free.

THE BINARY STARS AND HOPE
(Part II of III)

One night our astronomer came into contact with a binary star system. Sometimes called double stars, a binary system is two stars, usually one of which is larger and brighter than the other. The two stars revolve around the center of mass, which naturally lies closer to the larger star. (This is similar to the Earth-moon system. It is not strictly accurate to say that the moon revolves around the Earth. Both the Earth and the moon revolve around their center of mass. Since the Earth is 81 times heavier than the moon, the center of mass lies nearer to the Earth.)

When the astronomer adjusted his focus on the binary stars, the larger star began to boast to the astronomer of his control over his smaller companion. He felt that since the center of mass was closer to him that he was justifiably the master of the smaller star. In fact, the larger star cited a gravitational law which states that the center of mass of two bodies revolving about each other lies proportionately closer to the body of greater mass.

The smaller star was visibly troubled.

All of this angered the astronomer. He recalled the dream he had last week concerning the eclipse and the words of Habakkuk..."the righteous shall live by his faithfulness." So, the astronomer offered these words of encouragement to the smaller star. When the star still seemed troubled the astronomer decided to offer words of hope.

He read Galatians 5:1-12.

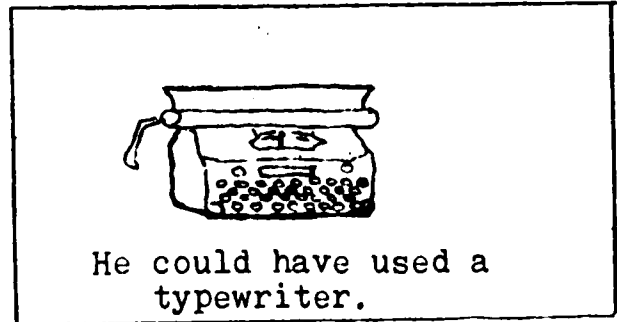

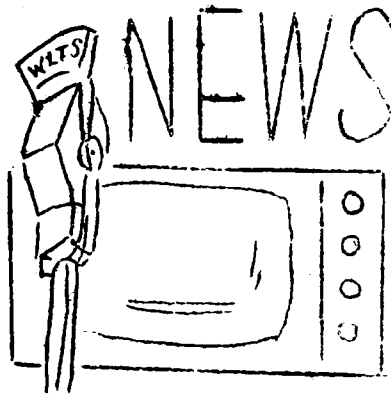
The Puritan Experience:

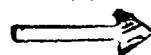

It seems that bowling was in existence in the time of the Old Testament. There are many references to this sport in our canon, some of which will be noted here. The earliest reference available is from Genesis where it states "These were allies of Abran" (14:13) (ED. note: there may be those of you who would question this on the basis of the plural form of alley. To you I say Shhhh.) Hosea 8:10 tells of hiring allies. Even Obadiah gets into the act by echoing the cry of every bowler on a bad night, "All your allies have deceived you" (1:7) Luke in his parable of the Great Supper has the command to go out to the streets and lanes of the city. The first board meeting is October 15. The Student Body President, Vice-President, Faculty, and Class Presidents will attend. A student newsletter will be published to inform the Board of happenings on campus (student involvement, concerns, etc.).



THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STUDENT BODY CONSTITUTION

At the Student Body meeting, Tuesday morning, the following amendment to the Constitution was proposed. Its purpose is to help expedite the election process which takes place at the end of the school year. Last year there was some complication which this amendment could prevent in the future. The underlined words are the affected parts.

Article VIII, Section 2 (second sentence): Officers of the second and third year classes shall be elected at the close of the preceeding spring term, within one week following the last regular meeting of the Student Body.
