## AN OPEN LETTER TO THE SEMINARY COMMUNITY

When are we going to sensitize ourselves to the cries of our hungry brothers and sisters throughout the world? Are we suffering from "compassion fatigue?"

After reading my free copy of the December issue of "World Encounter", I can no longer restrain myself. I have already passively followed the rapid decline of the world food situation that began to appear in American newspapers about a year ago, even though the situation actually reached the critical stage two

years ago.

Why have we, the affluent citizens of the United States, kept quiet (eg. our role in the World Food Council), for so long? Do we fool ourselves into believing that this is just sensationalist news reporting? Do we no longer believe the U.N. Declaration of Human Rights that declared that every human being "the right to food?" I suspect that from the beginning it was only a lofty ideal which really can't be taken seriously. It's no secret that we are the most affluent society that ever existed, yet we want even more for ourselves. It's no use to quote statistics of how grossly overfed we are and how undernourished the rest of the world is, because many of us still believe that "there will always be the poor."

Well, now that the LCA has taken action, and declared that it is our Christian duty to act with money and personal sacrifice, it is up to us not to relegate this demand on our lives to second rate status. Shouldn't our response go beyond our concern for

the sake of world peace and stability?

Let's at least talk about these issues and maybe some kind of long range action can come out of our life together in Christ. Arbitrarily, I would like to suggest that all interested students, faculty and friends meet in Main Dorm lounge on Thursday, November 14 at 7 PM to collectively raise our consciousness and brainstorm for an active response.



November 11 commemorates Martin of Tours. He was born (c. 316) of a pagan family in the Roman province in what is now Hungary. He grew up in Lombardy and, at the age of 10 decided to become a catechumen. He served as a soldier in the Roman army but found it increasingly difficult to reconcile Christianity with the military life. Leaving the army (not without accusations of cowardice), he became a hermit. In 360 he went to Hilary, Bishop of Potiers, and lived in a sort of monastic community. He was consecrated Bishop of Tours in 371, and chose to live not in the episcopal palace but in a cave, with his office in a nearby hut. He traveled widely. evangelizing rural Gaul and founding monasteries, He died November 8, 397. at a distant outpost of his diocese and was buried November 11. Martin Luther was baptized on St. Martin's day and was given the name of this saint. Martin was one of the first holy men who was not a martyr to be publicly honored as a saint, and his influence was felt from Ireland to Africa and Asia November 17 commemorates Elizabeth. daughter of King Andrew II of Hungary. She was born in the summer of 1207. At the age of 14 she was married to Louis IV. the Landgrave of Thuringia, to seal a political alliance. The marriage was a happy one and the parents lived with their three children in the Wartburg Castle near Eisenach. Elizabeth was generous to the poor and, with her husband, she founded two hospitals and sought work for the unemployed. Louis died of the plague September 11, 1227, while going to join a crusade. Elizabeth left the Wartburg and, having provided for her children, formally renounced the world on Good Friday 1228, joining the third order of St. Francis. She submitted wholly to the orders of a confessor. whose care of her was ruthless, and she lived her last years in unnatural austerity. She died November 17, 1231, at the age of 24, and is buried at Marburg. She has been one of the most beloved saints of the German people, and countless hospitals have been named for her.

Sojourner Truth was a woman, a mother, a Christian and a slave. She had many roles in this life. As the quote and history indicates she was able to do all quite well, even though she had no choice in those roles. How many of our mothers, wives, girlfriends, sisters and friends have choices in those roles? We have a long way to go before everyone has equality.

I feel we have freedom in Christ but many ardent Christians cannot extend that freedom for man, or for his help-mate woman. It's great that women in our Church can be ordained. It's terrific until they are! Are there jobs? Are there men who'll accept them and not feel threatened by them? Is there the same economic advantages for both men and women in the Church? All I know is that I'm glad I ar'nt a woman for there are dat little men in black, who say women can't have as men rights as man, cause Christ want a woman.

Who has the strength today to ask and answer those men: "Whar did your Christ come from? From God and a woman. Not bad - for a woman. She must be worth something?

Palette suggests for a beautiful Toykey? this year try the following steps:

TOMMY TURKEY DELIGHT

4 cups sherry or red wine 1 10-12 lb. toykey; ½ lb. butter; salt, pepper, poultry seasoning.

1. Place toykey in roasting pan.

2. Pour on a cup of sherry/wine inside toykey.

3. Spread butter over toykey skin.

4. Generously season inside and outside of turkey.

5. Pour 1 cup of sherry/wine in bottom of

roast pan.

6. Drink other two cups of sherry/wine while preparing Toykey ( A beer or some other beverage may be substituted here)

7. Prepare to stuff toykey.

8. After stuffing cover toykey with aluminum foil.

9. Roast 3 hrs. at 375 degrees.

10. Take out and carve in beautiful hunks of dinner.

Chestnut and Sausage Stuffing Cut a 1-pound loaf of day-old white bread. crusts removed, into small cubes and toast the cubes in a preheated very slow oven (275°F.) until they are lightly browned. Put the cubes in a large bowl, add 1 tablespoon salt and I teaspoon each of thyme, pepper, and oregano, and toss the mixture well. In a heavy skillet saute! 1½ cups minced onions and the reserved liver from the turkey, chopped, in 2 sticks or 1 cup butter for 10 minutes. Add 1 pound country\_style sausage meat. crumbled, and simmer the mixture, stirring, for five minutes. Stir in  $\frac{1}{2}$  pound cooked ham, ground,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup minced celery, and 1/3cup minced parsley and remove the pan from the heat. Add the mixture to the bread

cubes with 3 eggs, lightly beaten, and  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup light cream and combine the mixture well. Fold in  $1\frac{1}{2}$  pounds chestnuts, braised and drained, and let the stuffing cool completely and then stuff the old bird. Don't forget to baste the bird every 20 minutes.

CRANBERRY WINE JELLY
Make cranberry sauce and chill it
overnight or cheat like we did and
buy it from the store.

In a small bowl sprinkle  $2\frac{1}{2}$  tablespoons
gelatin over  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup cold water to soften
for 10 minutes. In a saucepan combine

for 10 minutes. In a saucepan combine 3 cups oranberry juice,  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup medium dry Madeira,  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup orange juice, and 1 tablespoon sugar and cook the mixture over moderate heat until it is hot. Add the softened gelatin and stir the mixture until the gelatin is dissolved. Put the saucepan in a pan of ice water and let the mixture cool, stirring occasionally, but do not let it set.

Rinse twelve ½-cup timbale molds or any molds in cold water and dry them. Pour 2 tablespoons of the jelly mixture into each of the molds and put them in a pan of crushed ice until the jelly is set. Spoon 2 tablespoons cranberry sauce, drained into each of the timbales filling them half-way with the jelly mixture, and chill them until the jelly is set.

To unmold the jellies run a sharp knife around the edge of each mold, lower the molds into hot water for an instant, and invert them onto a dish, tapping them to release the jelly.

Serves 12.

BUTTERED CREEN BEANS

In a large kettle cook 3 pounds green beans in 6 quarts boiling salted water over moderately high heat for 8 minutes. or until they are tender. Drain the beans in a colander and refresh them under running cold water until they are cool. Trim the beans and cut them into desired lengths or leave them whole. In a large skillet heat the beans with 2 tablespoons minced parsley in 1 stick or  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup butter over moderate heat, shaking the pan to coat them with the butter. Season the beans with salt and pepper to taste, transfer them to a heated vegetable dish. and top them with 2 tablespoons butter, cut into bits. Serves 12.

ANGU de MIIHO (CORNNEAL PUDDING)
In a heavy saucepan bring 5 cups water with 1 tablespoon salt to boil. Reduce the heat to a simmer and add 2 cups yellow cornmeal in a stream, stirring constantly with a wooden spoon. Add 2 tablespoons butter or bacon fat and simmer the mixture, stirring constantly, for 5 minutes or until it is thick.
Turn the mixture into a buttered bowl, let it set for 2 to 3 minutes, and unmold it onto a serving platter.





### M.A.R. MEETING

On Monday, November 11 at 2:00pm an M.A.R. meeting was held in the Library. We were fortunate to have a representative from the Division For Professional Leadership, Mr. George Hoog, with us. Other members present were Dr. Lee and Dr. Krodel, Sr. Margaret Kreller, representative for the diaconate, and five concerned students. The meeting lasted one hour and a half and devoted itself to general discussion and particular questions and needs.

As M.A.R. candidates we are being theologically trained and receiving practical experience by an accredited seminary. We are training to be professional church workers not "qualified Sunday School teachers." Then what variety lies within the church for us? What future does the church hold for an M.A.R.?

One way of searching out these questions may be an overall look at ourselves (in the synods, agencies, institutions and churches). This would involve contact between the synod and the M.A.R. student during the course of studies at seminary. Some advice was given that we should become familiar with a member of our synod, expose this person to our specific qualifications and hopefully he or she will act as an intervener for us. Another suggestion was to complete the PSS (personal support system) form. A proposal was mentioned that there be a central bank of vacancies listing established not only in the synods but also in the DPL, for the M.A.R.'s.



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


