

## FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE?

Having been through college and through almost four years of Seminary education I have encountered many financial aid programs; by far the most confusing and frustrating program is the one used by the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia. I would therefore like to ask some questions.

The 1975-76 catalog states: "Available to All Students: --Grants-in-aid based on actual need. Supported by annual income of 18 endowed Student Aid Funds, congregational gifts and other contributions. ...Aid must be applied for annually, Assistance is given only on the basis of need as revealed in each case by a completed financial information form, available from the Treasurer, with whom a personal interview is also required."

The questions I have are as follows: (1) Who makes the final decision as to whether aid is granted or refused. The catalog seems to suggest that this decision is made at the discretion of the Treasurer. (2) What are the limits of the "18 endowed Student Aid Funds, congregational gifts and other contributions?"

(3) I am aware that a committee does exist for the purpose of financial aid; who is on the committee, when do they meet and can a student address this committee?

The purpose of this article is not to complain or to point fingers. It is rather to push for clarity. How much assistance can students expect from Seminary? What definite procedure does a student follow to apply for financial assistance? Who makes the final decision? In short, Where does the student go for help? The catalog is at worst confusing and at best vague when it comes to the question of financial aid. Does the prudent fiscal management of the institution truly endeavor to provide financial aid for sindents enduring hardship or does prudent fiscal management endeavor to remain prudent?

For the sake of the students attending this institution and for those who will attend this seminary; I would hope that a clear and precise policy statement concerning financial aid would emerge from the administration. I am, quite frankly, baffled and look to faculty and administration to define and clarify the parameters.
