

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

The Hebrews were aware of the power of knowing and uttering a name, that is why they were so careful to avoid the use of the tetragramaton (YHWH) in their writings when possible. To know a person by name is to know his very essence, to experience her very being. I therefore salute the members of the group who now call themselves Women and Men in Dialogue, having changed their name from The Dialogue on Women's Role in the Ministry, a title which bespeaks of exclusiveness and not honest and trusting interaction.

As a returning senior I am pleased to see so many female faces on campus. To me this is a witness that all people of God are now beginning to take their gifts seriously and are serving their Lord as best they can. Accordingly ministry is done by people, not males or females. A person's sex informs his ministry to be sure, but does not constitute its essence. For the Christian the essence of her person and ministry can only be the gift of faith which constitutes their relationship to the Triune God.

Perhaps a still better title would be Christians in Dialogue Concerning Their Ministry and could be a vehicle for a discussion of an entire spectrum of concerns found in their forms of service. Nevertheless, this group seems to be maturing in its concerns and will have my support and participation. I hope you will come too!

Robert Benne and Philip Hefner - A Review

"The Christian faith understands sacrifice as a response to evil...
The Christian engages in the sacrificial life because he believes that the sacrifice may be the occasion for a gracious, redemptive resolution of the wrathful conditions in which he exists... The sacrifice did not guarantee grace, it did not cause it or manipulate God. The active stance of man in bringing the offering provided that man would be an active participant in God's action. The grace bestowed by God was a participatory grace, not one in which the participants were passive spectators." (1)

If this was just a poor attempt of a Chrisitan theologian to explain the meaning of the Hebrew sacrifices, this might not be so threatening. When these thoughts are the basic theological stance in <u>Defining America</u> by Robert Benne and Philip Hefner, they are a problem. This text has been recommended by Robert Marshall, President of the LCA for use by parish pastors during the Bicentennial. (of course that does not necessarily mean that he read it.) Benne and Hefner are from Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago.

The problem is that they take this notion of sacrifice and man's participatory stance in those sacrifices and develop a theology of civil sacrifice for the Christian. Man is becoming an active participant in God's gracious action in the world. "When Christian faith carries on its dialogue with the civil religion of America, it acknowledges an immediate bond with the American dream, since both concerned with sacrificial living, but it calls the civil religion to reform its dedication into a form that may be more productive of genuine peace, shalom with man and nature." It sounds very nice, but the confusion of Old Testament sacrificial motifs and Christian living should begin to bother us. Benne and Hefner only show their true Christology once, in a line that could be skimmed over very easily. "Jesus raised to a higher power what Jews before him and Christians after him embody in their sacrifices."

Do I need to explain to us at seminary that this is wrong? Or can I rely on the reader's Christology to say that this, in the mouth of a confessing evangelical Lutheran, is heresy?
