ADVENT VESPERS

Our traditional Seminary Advent Vesper service will be held at \$:00 p.m. on Tuesday, December 9 this year. The theme, chosen with regard to the date early in the Advent season, is the Annunciation. In a service of lessons and hymns centering on this theme, the choir will sing the fourth lesson (Luke 1.26-38) to a setting by Heinrich Schuetz. This setting will feature instrumental accompaniment and two soloists, Janenne Sass and Linda Beck. After the sermon by Dr. Bornemann the choir will offer a Cantata by Buxtehude, also accompanied by several musicians.

The entire service will be preceded by a program of ancient music beginning in the chapel at 7:30. In a sonata by Handel, Bluma Jacobs, who plays alto recorder, will be the guest artist. A number of students will present a sonato by James Paisible for recorders.



GUEST NIGHT THIS WEEK

This coming Thursday will be UFW night. Our guest for supper will be Fred Haage, a local representative for the United Farm Workers of America which represents migrant farm workers all over America. After dinner, at 6:30 Fred will show a film "Why We Boycott" (approximately 20 minutes) and lead a discussion in the Tappert Room of the Library.

For those of us who are not familiar with the work of the UFW and its charismatic leader Cesar Chavez this is a great opportunity to learn about them. The UFW was founded in 1966, and through non-violent picketing and boycotting has succeeded in raising the living and working conditions of migrant farm workers who are mostly Mexican-Americans or Blacks, especially in California.

Today the bitter struggle for contracts continues. The average farmworker in the nation earns \$1576 per year (US Department of Agriculture) and can only work an average of five months per year. As usual children suffer most since they do much work to help support their families and 90% never complete their education. Without dwelling on statistics, I would like to state that this union is unlike any other. It is devoted to the total welfare of its members, and all union workers, including Chavez, earn \$5 per week plus room and board.

An added attration for us at LTSP is Fred Haage himself. He is a 21 year old German student from Hamburg who is working for the UFW to complete his alternative service as a recognized conscientious objector to the West German army. He is sponsored by the Action Reconciliation Service for Peace, a private German organization founded in 1958 "out of concern that the churches and institutions of West Germany had lain dormant too long in the aftermath of World War II."

Regardless, if you want to hear about the UFW, or speak deutsch with Fred, or hear about ASF, welcome him and try to attend his short Henry Pawluk

ARTIST'S RECEPTION

There will be a reception for Mr. Daryl Mackie, the artist whose paintings have been on exhibition in the Library, on Sunday, December 7 at 3:00-5:00pm. The Reception will be held in the Upper Rotunda of the Library. All members of the Seminary Community are invited.

At the November meeting of the Board of East Mt. Airy Neighbors, proposals were adopted for consideration by the Commonwealth Court and for the Board of Education regarding an integration plan for Philadelphia Public Schools. A preface to the three proposals or recommendation explains that EMAN is composed of members of a community to which people came because they WANT to live in an integrated neighborhood. EMAN assumes that a desegregation plan will soon be mandated, and it urges the School Board to accept this inevitable fact, to exert moral and actual leadership, and to take the initiative in upholding democratic principles. The Human Relations Commission's Desegregation Plan is assumed to be the most feasible for implementation and most compatible with the community's priorities, IF it is expanded to include the following recommendations:

The first recommendation is to use the schools in this area that are already integrated such as Henry, Houston, and Jenks. EMAN urges that these schools be supported, as well as the alternative schools or special interest schools in this area which have brought young people of different races with a common interest and a willingness to share together. The Court is urged not to order any interventions in these operations.

The second recommendation is to use the community resources existing in this area to educate the community to the advantages of integrated schooling. The Court is urged to require that a cooperative community education effort be launched to precede by one year whatever physical implementation of integrated schooling is to occur.

The third recommendation is that the Court order a period of one year to be spent on mandatory staff re-education. EMAN recognizes that if the School District personnel do not understand or support the actions that will be required then desegregation will be doomed to failure and the efforts will result in frustration and upheaval. A program of school personnel re-education is seen by EMAN as THE critical factor in assessing a successful project.

Briefs containing these recommendations will be submitted to the Commonwealth Court in December.

FRIENDS OF GERMANTOWN AVENUE

On Thursday evening, November 20, some two dozen people from local businesses, neighborhoods, and institutions met at Ascension to discuss the plight and future of the Mt. Airy business district. Mr. Chris van de Velde, of West Mt. Airy Neighbors, acted as convener.

After a brief slide presentation, which showed revamped business districts in other cities, and some questions "What's this got to do with us?", outgoing City Development Coordinator Chris Weeks took over. He admitted that a large scale revamping would be out of the question for this area. Rather some action for a better cosmetic appearance would be offered.

In connection with this Mr. Weeks then pinpointed some problems in this business district. For one, many of the still open stores are rented and are owned by absentee landlords who care little about upkeep of the property. Second, those shopkeepers who have their shops on a lease are on short-term leases: They cannot afford facade improvements. Third, some shopkeepers are old and close to retirement: they will not sink much money into an enterprise they will be leaving in a few years.

Mr. Weeks spoke strongly of the need for a viable businessman's association. The last one in Mt. Airy died five years ago, partly due to personality clashes among the merchants. The "Friends of Germantown Avenue" is an attempt to restart a similar association.

The only action proposed was that a core group draft a letter to City Hall to request a market study of the business district from Cresheim Avenue to Hortter Street and that the city subsidize such a study.

After the meeting broke up, several merchants and neighbors introduced themselves to one another and discussed opinions and hopes for the district.

I will post a notice when I find out when the next FGA meeting is to be held.

PROGRESS REPORT ON OUR PETITION OF CONCERN

Last week I circulated a petition expressing concern over the effects that the continuing merger studies were having on the quality of education and life at Mt. Airy. Fifty-four students signed it.

During the same week Dr. Reumann and Dr. Krodel expressed concern over the impact that the petition might have. Therefore Dr. Krodel asked that the petition be studied by the First Degree Committee and the faculty before being released. The petition and fifty copies are now in his hands. It is now the responsibility of the student representatives on the First Degree Committee to discuss the meaning of the petition and explore the political complications of such duty as the petition clearly has a majority of signatures from the students on campus.

The intention of this delay is not "faculty censorship," but if our student representatives do not perform their tasks properly the petition could easily be pigeonholed in the faculty agenda.
