# GETTING TO KNOW YOUR LIBRARY AND LIBRARIANS BETTER

A close relationship exists between a scholar and the development of skill in the use of library resources. What is true of scholarship generally also applies to the field of theology. Two noteworthy examples illustrative of this relationsip come to mind. One of them is Martin Chemnitz (1522-1586), author of the famous Examen Concilii Tridentini and ce-author of the Formula of Concord. Chemnitz began his study of theology in Königsberg (since 1945 Kaliningrad in Russia on the Baltic Sea) while serving as librarian of the ducalcastle there. The other example that comes to mind is Adolf von Harnack (1851-1930) who in addition to his duties as professor in the University of Berlin and involvement in learned societies served as general director of the state library in Berlin (1905-1921).

An opportunity for LTSP students to develop their skills in the use of library resources will be given on Friday, October 1 at 1:30 P.M. in the library's reference and periodical section. This session is a direct result of a sizable number of students signing up during orientation week for additional briefing in the use of library resources. The Anti-Rar 1 session is not limited to students who are on campus this year for the first time; anyone interested is welcome. To qualify it is not necessary to aspire to the fame or learning of a Chemnitz or

#### REPORT OF THE STUDENT BODY MEETING

The first meeting of the Student Body for 1976-77 was called to order by President Bruce Ewen at 9:42 on September 22 in the Amphitheatre. The following were major items of business:

-Treasurer, Paul Scheitlin, presented a \$1950.00 budget. It was accepted by unanimous vote.

-A motion was made and carried to accept the following amendment to the bylaws:

Article IV Section 10

There shall be a Guest Night Committee composed of a chairman (or two chairmen) who shall enlist student participation in planning and carrying out the program. It shall be the function of this committee to plan and arrange for special interest persons to offer presentations to the Seminary Community.

-A motion was made and carried concerning money for athletic equipment as follows:

The Student Body Treasurer shall be directed to secure \$400. presently held in escrow by the administration and use it for the purchase of a pool table.

-A motion was made and carried by the necessary 2/3 majority to suspend the bylaws in order to deal with the following motion:

That the Athletic Committee be authorized to spend up to \$150. from the Operating Principal on equipment.

-Request was made for an assurance given that inquiry would be made into the installation of vending machines in the "Student Lounge" area in Hagan.

-The Nominating Committee: Jeff Hedin, Greg Wenhold and Margie Weiss, presented the following candidates for office:

The nominations were approved. There were no nominations from the floor. Elections were held by secret ballet beginning Monday, Sept. 27 at 9:00 and ending on Tuesday, Sept. 28 at 5:00 p.m.
