EVANGELISM PRACTICUM TO BE HELD DURING JANUARY

The evangelism practicum to be held during the January Intersession will be an opportunity to engage in face-to-face evangelism. Most of the 100 hours of the course will be used by the participants in calling on prospective church members, lapsed members, or specialized persons. The churches in which students are currently working will provide the

setting for the calling.

There will be three days of classroom activity (Jan. 3,4,5) conducted by Professor White, Dr. Edward K. Perry, and The Rev. P. Richard Grove. Thereafter the participants will meet each week for a short time to compare insights and experiences. Participants will keep a diary of their experiences and will prepare some sort of useful product (e.g. a short detailed syllabus for a pastor's class for membership, a brochure for the congregation, an action plan for evangelism in the congregation, etc.) A final evaluation and wrap-up will occur at the end of the last week of the term

Students who wish to experience or who have never before experienced this kind of direct witnessing activity will be welcome. A few lay persons will be recruited to participate in the course as well. For

FIRST PROFESSIONAL DEGREE COMMITTEE: The most recent meeting of the First Professional Degree Committee was held Monday, November 29, 1975 at 3:45 p.m. All four student body representatives were present. Following is a brief review of issues and/or actions. Please remeber that most actions of the committee are subject to faculty approval so that decisions made by the committee are tentative.

1. It was reported that KOSI (Koep Off Campus Students Informed) has been functioning well. Those students involved are to be commended for their

participation.

2. The committee discussed and approved a policy statement on Equivalincy Internship Programs for "Student preparing for part-seminary graduate study." Essentially, this provision would allow a student interested in part-sominary academic doctoral study to complete seminary in three years rather than four, subject to approval by synodical and seminary officials. Should this policy statement be approved by the faculty, more specific details will be share by the appropriate persons.

3. Professor Hughes was asked to report to the faculty the status of daily

devotions being held in the Chapel.

4. The sub-committee on Internship has been asked to consider the possibility and/ or feasibility of providing field work, CPE opportunities and internship in geriatric institutions. This action was taken as a result of a letter received from Germatown Home urging training of students in ministry to the elderly. 5. Dr. Lee has done a study on faculty course evaluation instruments and was asked to report to the faculty. It is hoped that instruments for course evaluation can be developed that will more precisely indicate whether professors have achieved course objectives.

In addition to the above, there were a number of personal petitions,

recommendations, and items of information shared.

you might want to look at the copyright laws revised by Congress for the first time in 67 years.

A teacher may not: Make multiple copies of a work for classroom use if it has already been copied for another class in the same institution; Make multiple copies of a short poem, a rticle, story, or essay from the same author more than once in a class term, or make multiple

copies from the same collective work or periodical issue more than three

times a term; Make multiple copies of works more than nine times in the same class term; Make a copy of works to take the place of an anthology; Make a copy of "consumable" materials

such as workbooks.

A teacher may: Make a single copy, for use in scholarly research, or in teaching, or in preparation for teaching a class, of the following:
A chapter from a book; An article from a periodical or newspaper; A short story, short essay, or short poem, whether or not from a collected work;

A chart, graph, diagram, drawing, cartoon or picture from a book, periodical, or newspaper.

Make multiple copies for classroom use only, and not to exceed one per student in a class, of the following:

A complete poem, if it is less than 250

words and printed on mot more than two pages; An excerpt from a longer poem,

if it is less than 250 words. There's more, but we have enough to throw a Prof..
