LIFE IN THE REFECTORY

I am writing this just to reiterate some of the procedures regarding meals in the Refectory. You are asked to leave the dining area by the time the chimes ring; this is at 1:10 for lunch and 6:00 for dinner. You are welcome to take your coffee and conversation to another room in the Refectory. This is done so the waiters may have time to set the tables for the next meal. Waiters have classes to get to and things to do just like you do. If you feel rushed, think how rushed the waiters feel if they have to wait an extra five or ten minutes for you to finish. If you can't eat what you are served in 30 minutes, think of the waiters who have to "wolf down" the same meal in about 5-10 minutes before you come in. Also ARA regulations require all customers to be out of the eating area while it is being cleaned and set for the next meal. Besides it is difficult to wipe and set a table around the people sitting there.

Salads, bread, and butter are now available at the Salad Table and desserts at the Dessert Table. In order to eliminate traffic problems

in the dining area, please go one table at a time.

It is not possible to give the individual service you would like due to the large number of people involved. Please refrain from making special requests for items not on the table. These requests only serve to keep the waiters from giving regular service to other people and

from the waiters' perspective speed up the pace of a meal.

Tables may be reserved for meetings. But please inform the head waiter of the time and number of people at least a day beforehand. Guests are welcome too. Please inform the head waiter also at least a day beforehand, especially if they number two or more and especially if they come on weekends when we work with a limited staff and set only the tables we need. Being informed beforehand helps us accomodate everyone.

I remind you also to please be prompt for meals. Lunch is at 12:40 and dinner at 5:30 (Sunday 2:00). Latecomers make it difficult to give adequate attention to those who came on time. Besides coming

on time permits equal distribution of food.

Please be sure to sign the weekend slips at Thursday's lunch. gives us an indication of how many to expect on the weekend. If you can't be at Thursday's lunch, let the head waiter know your plans

beforehand, especially if you will have guests.

Our prices are \$1.20 for lunch, \$1.95 for dinner, \$2.25 for Sunday dinner, 20¢ for coffee, tea, or milk, and 25¢ for soup. If you take one type of salad, the price is 20¢, more than one, the usual charge for lunch \$1.20. Please have exact change as much as possible--giving small change is not too difficult but large bills are difficult to handle (this again is especially true for weekends). Buy meal tickets from Mr. Kaufmann beforehand if at all possible.

All announcements are made at the beginning og the meal followed by the prayer. Please keep your announcements brief, especially when there are several. The longer you talk, the colder the food gets and

the less time there is to eat.

Complaints are welcome too but please channel them properly. the Suggestion Box or speak to a member of the Refectory Committee. Mrs. Finlader, the food service manager, also is willing to hear what you have to say. Complaints to writers are often forgotten during CONTINUED LATER

Finally please show courtesy to the waiters. They are people too, probably sharing the same gripes many of you have and facing many additional pressures during the course of a meal. "Bitchiness" and lack of cooperation only add to the discomforts and tensions of this job. Waiters work because they need the money not because they enjoy tormenting diners. Often times your own attitudes are reflected back to you by the waiters—if you are cooperative, they will be cooperative; if you are cranky, they will be cranky. Over all the waiters are happy to serve you.

Interred by the Gestapo during World War II, Lilje narrowly missed execution by the war's end. Later, he became the Lutheran Bishop of Hanover and the president of LWF. Lilje's recent death this past January has prompted Dr. Lehmann, who knew the Bishop personally, to prepare a memorial message in his commemoration.

- I. The meeting as called to order at 10:10 by President Even. A quorum was present.
- II. The minutes of the September 22, 1975 meeting were read and accepted.
- III. The agenda was approved.
 - IV. President's Report
 - A. The new by-laws for this institution were approved at the last meeting of the Board of Directors. One of the new standing committees will be a Student Affairs Committee. To students were appointed. They ere Mr. Peter Pettit and Ms. Claire Burkat.
 - B. It was announced that the Student Health Services is considering being discontinued.
 - C. Report from CLTEN
 - 1. Gettysburg and Philadelphia are in the process of comparing their seminary curriculums.
 - 2. In the area of Admissions, Gettysburg, does not require synodical endorsement where Philadelphia does.
 - 3. An application fee of \$20 and an admissions acceptance fee of \$50 will be instituted at both institutions.
 - 4. Curriculum comparisons:

Philadelphia Gettysburg

-2years of field education -1 year of field education -2 intersessions required -3 intersessions required -core curriculum -2 tracks; A & B

5. The life styles statement was given to the seminary presidents. (Our Student Body voiced concern over the development of such a statement.)

6. It was suggested by one of our students that CLTEN consider dealing with Lutheran students who are not at Lutheran seminaries in the northeast.

- D. Faculty selection
- 1. On Thursday, February 17 at 9:30 Rev. Margaret Krych will present a lecture at Ascension. A Student Opinion Questionairre will be passed out and the designated interviewing committee will speak with her afterwards and an evaluation will be drawn up.
- 2. The same vill happen on Thursday, February 24 when Dr. Hans Schwarz vill present a lecture.
 - 3. 1 or 2 others are to be invited to lecture in the fields of Christian Education and Systematics before a decision by the Board's Committee on Faculty will be made.
- 4. It is hoped that by the April Board meeting there vill be a recommendation for both Christian Education and Systmeatics.

 - A. \$525.95 left in the savings account and \$196.36 left in the Checking account. We are still waiting for the Student Body dues from second semester.
