too have felt disappointment and expressed complaints and grievances about the "tyranny" of a particular process, especially the one which was currently "oppressing" me. The feelings of those currently involved with one of the other processes are not foreign to me, and I can heartily sympathize with them. For this reason, I could not help but want to share this excerpt from a work by a person who knew eal tyranny. He gives the following example of how to treat a tyrant. (I think it can be applied to a

"tyrannical" process.):

"We read of a widow who stood and prayed for her tyrant most devoutly, asking God to give him long life, etc. The tyrant heard it and was much astonished because he knew very well that he had done her much harm, and that this was not the usual prayer for tyrants, so he asked her why she prayed thus for him. She answered, "I had ten cows when your grandfather lived and ruled. He took two of them and I prayed that he might die and your father might become lord. This is what happened, and your father took three cows. I prayed again that you might become lord and that your father might die. Now you have taken four cows, and so I am praying for you, for now I am afraid that your successor will take the last cdw and everything that I have." (by Martin Luther in Whether Soldiers, Too, Can be Saved")

Here, I must admit that the processess which I have encountered at seminary are not as tyrannical as the tyrants in the example. Greek didn't take cows from Te; Intern placement wasn"t able to put me out of one third of my possessions; Internship left me with more than twenty percent of what of my possessions; Internally for the call process to take away I started with; and I surely don't expect the outly process to take away everything I have left. GOD AND THE BANG

The recent interest on the part of religious thinkers in the apparent convergence of the Big Bang theory and the Genesis account of creation reveals a misunderstanding of both science and Christianity. Science is presumed capable of penetrating to the ultimate orgin of things; Christian truth is assumed to gain credence in proportion to its verifiability.

The Big Bang theory does not in fact explain how the universe began but only how the universe insofar as we know it began. There still remains the question of what there was before the Big Bang. This points to the fact, established by Immanuel Kant nearly 2 centuries ago, that science is innately incapable of ascertaining the ultimate origin of the universe. The event of cosmic origination is beyond the grasp of scientific method. Thus the Big Bang theory can not be emplisted in support of the Genesis account anymore than the steady state theory or any other theory elevated by the consensus of the scientific community. No scientific hypothesis can prove or disprove what the Book of Genesis tells us about the relationship of God to His creation.

But why need Christians feel anxious to align themselves with the respectability of modern science? It has been a persistent anxiety but certainly one which fails to appreciate the nature of religious truth as something inaccessible to the methodology of the scientific enterprise. Furthermore, it is an anxiety which points to an underlying failure of faith. One of the modern faces of sin is our need for certainty -- our need to buttress our fragile confidence in God with extraneous supports and assurances. The Gospel compels us to abandon these supports and assurances, enticing though they are, and to believe in it despite our inability to prove its truth. This is the majesty of faith. So letsus not worry what the scientists say about Big Bangs and steady states. They can threaten us only if we allow ourselves to be seduced by them.

Unfortunately, too few of us realize the resources and facilities he make available to us.

I have enjoyed working with the Seminary audio and video equipment for a few years now, but only recently have I discovered some of the ways in which these resources can help put a message across. Chris is willing and happy to help you employ the most effective medium(s) for your message.

In a statement from the L.T.S.P. Campus Media Service (did you know there was one?) he shows some of our capabilities:

The VTR STUDIO

The videotape recording studio was in use nearly every day during the 1977/78 academic year. Homiletics, Pastoral Care, Ministry in Small Groups, and Liturgics courses all make extensive use of the facilities.
